Last year it was decided that the Chapter Activities awards would be made annually and be tabulated from January to December, Hence be presented until April 2008. The Color Guard







Restoring Montpelier - - A Fitting Tribute to James Madison **Compelier** **Come of & resident ** **James & Delly ** **Cadison** **

will be used in the restoration of this elegant Georgian mansion to the way it was when James Madison lived there.

Quinn, the tall, trim president of the Montpelier Foundation, continues, "More than any other Founding Father, Madison was the thinker whose innovative ideas laid

the foundation for America's unprecedented form of government. It was his contemporaries who first called him 'Father of the Constitution.'"

James Madison also wrote the Bill of Rights. He wrote George Washington's inaugural address . . . and the congressional response to George Washington's inaugural address . . . and George Washington's response to the congressional response to his inaugural address . . .

Thomas Jefferson said that he PRESIDENT JAMES MAD would never have wanted to be president if he could not have had Madison in his cabinet. Jefferson was once asked what he thought of Madison and he shocked his questioner with his direct and unequivocal response: "He is the greatest man in the world."

After being the key player in the writing of the Constitution, Madison became the leader of the ratification effort. Along with Alexander Hamilton and John Jay, Madison wrote the Federalist Papers, which were a series of 85 newspaper articles that explained

to the public how the proposed Constitution would work and advocated its ratification by "We the People" in special conventions in the states called to decide that sole question.

The *Federalist Papers* were also bound in book form and became a virtual debater's handbook for votaries of its ratification. The *Federalist Papers* are still used today as the key source for discerning the original understanding of the Constitution's meaning and were called by Thomas Jefferson "the best commentary on the principles of government, which ever was written."

So, by now, you are thinking, where is the James Madison memorial in Washington, D.C? Which denomination of currency in your pocket has his picture on it? Which face on Mt. Rushmore is his? And, where is that James Madison presidential library anyway?

The answer is: There isn't one.

What we do have is his home, Montpelier. However, it was in private hands up until only two decades ago. Located in Virginia, about 25 miles from Jefferson's home, Monticello, Montpelier was sold after Madison died. It eventually became the private estate of one of the duPont family members, and served as such for most of the last century or so. During that time, they built a legacy of their own, installing two horse racing tracks (both a flat track and a

steeplechase course) and initiating the Montpelier Hunt Races, which are still run today.

Thoroughbreds not only come to Montpelier to race, but many also live there in barns built by the duPonts on the grounds. The estate includes not only extensive pasture lands, but also a 200-acre old-growth forest, on this pristine property which Madison described as just "a squirrel's jump from heaven."

Marion duPont Scott generously bequeathed

bequeathed Montpelier to "We the People" in her will, stating her desire that it would be restored "in such a manner as to conform as nearly as possible with the architectural pattern which existed when said property was owned and occupied by President Madison."

That restoration is currently underway. As Michael Quinn "Montpelier has noted, the last home of a Founding Father to become a public site and to undergo restoration. No restoration project of this significance to the founding of the American republic will ever be undertaken again."

And, they are doing it right. They spent a year and a half conducting a detailed study of the mansion before beginning restoration. The investigation tapped the talents of a national team of experts and used stateof-the-art technology. Among these were the skills of Colonial Williamsburg's Architectural Research Department, architects, engineers, architectural historians, paint analysts, conconservationists, struction masonry experts, archaeologists, curators and restoration specialists.

In 2001-2002, researchers poured through stacks of

old documents, cut probes in walls, located lost photographs, and thankfully discovered that despite two centuries of additions and alterations, the original home remained remark-ably intact underneath the changes.

The researchers' efforts paid off, winning the Buchanan Award, which is given to recognize contributions in this field. John C. Larson, vice president for restoration of Old Salem, Inc., who nominated Montpelier for the award, commented

"Never before has such an intensive examination been made of a president's home. Montpelier is to be commended for setting a new standard in the investigation and recording methodologies for a historic structure."

Now the work has begun. Squirrels in the 200year-old black walnut trees that look over Montpelier have not seen such activity since those trees were seedlings. In addition to the architectural detective


game of discovering the locations of old doors, staircases and even scraps of original wallpaper stored inside a wall by a preservation-minded mouse, the project now involves putting 200-yearold construction skills back to work.

> Brickwork is being replaced, columns are being restored, and furnishings are being located or recreated. The special serrated roofs used on the mansion's wings that were designed by Thomas Jefferson are being rebuilt (even some of the original timbers were discovered, having been reused in another building constructed later on property). The serrated roofs were a Jefferson innovation that he had used at his home, Monticello. Jefferson, who was Madison's best friend for half a century (the closest and most productive partnership among all the Founders), also designed the front entrance of Montpelier.

Most interestingly, at least from a historian's point of view, the upstairs room that contained Madison's library is being restored. It was here that he conducted months of research, using

his own collection of 4,000 books, which included crates of books that Jefferson sent him from France, preparatory to the creation of the Constitution. Political Scientist Douglas Adair described this effort as "probably the most fruitful piece of scholarly research ever carried out by an American."

It was in this room that he conducted his research and conceived the Virginia Plan, which became the basis of the Constitution. When Madison arrived at the Constitutional Convention in Philadelphia, he was the only one with a comprehensive plan to solve the problems that the 13 states faced under the Articles of Confederation. The Virginia Plan immediately became the focus of all debate, and despite four months of contentious argumentation, it survived remarkably intact. This was in no small part because Madison impressed his colleagues as "the best informed man of any point in debate."



One historian described him as "having libraries in his head." That library is being restored at Montpelier.

Michael Quinn sets down his brick. He looks up and reflects, "Our purpose is to transform Montpelier into a national monument to James Madison - to preserve and promote his legacy for all future generations of Americans."

It certainly is a monumental project, both in terms of physical work and fund raising, and it is scheduled to continue through 2008. During that time though, special "hard hat" tours are available to the public (see www. montpelier.org), allowing people today to see the construction of



this house as its original builders saw it two centuries ago. Three major exhibitions have already been created and installed at the Education Center to give visitors a taste of what the mansion's recreated interiors will look like when they are completed.

It is not difficult to imagine Jefferson and Madison standing there, holding a brick in their hands, and discussing ancient Greek architecture, Lockean philosophy, Athenian history, scientific farming, or perhaps even how to go about creating the most important important political experiment in human history...

Women's Rights Flourish in the American Revolution by: Miss Julene Paul of Los Angeles

America's success as a major world power relies heavily on the fact that it remains a progressive and forward-thinking nation. Our nation's ability to grow

advance encourages not only economic and political success, but also social and moral progress. Pre-revolutionary War, colonial women remained bound by archaic English laws, and completely upon men financially, But when bold women like Abigail Adams, Mercy Otis Warren, and Deborah Sampson Gannett transcended boundaries as

and change in the face of ideological

part of the War effort, women emerged from the War with greater rights and the first stirrings of women's rights sentiment. Women in early colonial society suffered from

unfair laws and practices inherited from England and other European countries. Women were often for-ced to marry because "colonial inheritance laws, drawn from English law, ensured her economic dependency, for sons were given land while daughters had to be content with movable property." And while women should never have to seek out marriage as a means of survival, the

condition of marriage did not prove such an attractive financial option after all. For, legally, "in her new status as female convert, or woman covered, all that she owned became her husband's property, even the clothes on her back". This consideration hindered a woman and could trap her in an unhappy or violent marriage. The early colonial laws did not ensure freedom and independence for woman, particularly financial.

However, Abigail Adams, one of the most prominent female figures of the American Revolution, used her influence upon her husband, John Adams to secure further rights for women within the forming of the United States. The couple had consistently enjoyed an unusually open, honest exchange of ideas. As the war with England began, Abigail realized the greater impact her views on issues like slavery and women's rights could have on forming our country. However, when she first brought this issue to his attention, "[John] listened to her suggestions that women might stand to benefit from the notion of independence as well as men, but [was] unwilling to turn his mind and attention to such an ancillary proposition as women just yet". When Abigail did not receive the response she hoped from her normally thoughtful husband she persisted producing some of the most convincing arguments for women's rights. Adams wrote her

husband, "But you must remember that arbitrary power is like most other things which are very hard, very liable to be broken - - and notwithstanding all of your wise Laws and Maxims we have it in our power not only to free ourselves but to subdue our Masters", With this statement, Abigail likens the tyranny of England to the theoretical tyranny of men over women, a bold and heated statement for its time. Her carefully worded statements did have an influence on her husband, later the President of the United States, and ultimately influenced the formation of the American government.

Similarly, Mercy Otis Warren, a female satirist whose greatest weapon in the war was her pen, roused the troops and early colonists and fiercely displayed her patriotism in her literary pieces. Because most colonial women did not receive formal education, Warren overcame considerable education and cultural handicaps to become a formidable literary power. Many prominent male figures in the Revolution recognized Warren's talent and contribution to the War effort, similar to the importance of Thomas Paine's influential pamphlet *Common Sense*. Warren wrote that every city in America stood to preserve "the inherent rights of men, conferred on all by the God of nature, and the privileges of Englishmen claimed by Americans from the sacred sanction of compacts. With this statement, Warren expressed more eloquently than many of her

male contemporaries the passion she and other American women had for the autonomy of our country. Also, as one of the first female writers, Warren paved the way for generations of female writers. Warren's contributions to the war effort through her writing both raised morale of the troops and asserted the power of the female in the American literary world.

Lastly, Deborah Sampson Gannett, the starkest symbol of female patriotism during the American Revolution, disguised herself as a man and served in the colonial military. Her heroism and bravery transcend gender. She risked not only her life but her reputation and social standing to join the war effort and fight alongside men. Gannett was the first woman to ever receive a war pension from the American Government when she was "voted a war veteran's pension by Congress in 1805". Gannett set a precedent for women, and the government acknowledged her equal service in the military by granting her a benefit that male servicemen earned.


The Revolutionary War proved to be a step forward for women's rights, with new legislation tentatively granting well-deserved rights to the women who helped defend the country. In an important social change, "following the break with England, American legislatures recognized the validity of absolute divorce with the right to remarry as well divorce from bed and board," this legislative change

shows a shift from an absolute dominant male role to the option of women to remove themselves from potentially violent or abusive relationships. Additionally, women required financial independence to truly be free from a man's grasp. Accordingly, the United States government recognized this right, and "after the Revolution, daughters gained equal right to a share of all the family's property, including what was often most valuable - - its land". Additionally, sons and daughters were considered equals in matters of inheritance. Slowly but surely, the fundamental rights of women were legally realized in the years following the Revolutionary War.

With the American Revolution and the establishment of a new government, the early citizens of the United States had the opportunity to retain the merits of old western wisdom while relinquishing the less progressive and less just practices of England. Accordingly, the framers of the Constitution and early American government took influence from women like Abigail Adams, Mercy Otis Warren, and Deborah Gannett. These women set precedents for our country and laid the groundwork for the Seneca Falls Convention, the women's rights movement, and early feminism. With new legislation in place, early American women slowly moved toward making the phrase "All men are created equal: truly gender-blind".



Washington's Unsung Heroes

The Society's Regulations concerning the wearing of SAR medals and awards can be found in the official handbook, along with the requirements for each of these awards. The handbook is updated periodically and republished. A current edition can be downloaded from the NSSAR web site - - www.sar.org. and may be purchased from the Merchandise Department. With the exception of a few medals that were struck for specific events, medals are available from the NSSAR Merchandise Department.

Things that should be observed concerning the wearing of SAR medals include when to wear them and how to wear them. The wearing of SAR medals is encouraged and they should be worn at all appropriate occasions such as SAR and other lineage society events. It is meaningless for Compatriots to present medals as recognition for good works, if they don't wear their own SAR medals. Medals should be worn on formal and semiformal occasions. The full size medals should

be worn on informal attire, but for appearance sake, should be only worn on a suit or sports coat. Once a member has been awarded three or more medals, he should have them mounted on a ribbon bar. Each medal is sewn on the bar to present uniform

appearance. The order in which they must be mounted is provided on the following pages of this article. The NSSAR Merchandise Department provides mounting service for a minimal charge.

Miniature medals should be worn on formal attire. They should be mounted on ribbon bars, with the lowest bar worn slightly above the breast pocket. Full size medals should be worn in the same manner. Additionally, when wearing your medals, you should limit the number of "pins" to just one.

Those that have served in our Armed Forces are entitled to wear their military decorations/medals. These always take precedence over all SAR medals.

Every member of the Society is entitled to wear the membership badge, which is shown above. Chapter Presidents, State and National officers wear their membership badge suspended from a neck ribbon as shown above. All others use a traditional ribbon drape on which stars representing each supplemental ancestor recorded at NSSAR headquarters may be worn.

Items that may be worn on the neck ribbon in addition to the Supplemental stars include the past Vice Presidents emblem, past Chapter and State Presidents emblem, and Trustees emblem. No more than three of the emblems may be worn at one time.

Many of us also belong to other Societies that present medals. Protocol dictates that when combining medals from various Societies, the official founding date of each society establishes the order in which the medals should be worn.

When you become a Compatriot of the SAR you were probably given a "Rosette" which is worn on the left lapel of the jacket.

It is a very effective recruiting tool as you will be asked what it represents. You are encouraged to wear it as often as possible. The NSSAR Merchandise Department also offers a very attractive embroidered breast crest that adds a "touch of class" to any blazer. It

may be worn when you wear your medals. The National Color Guard Committee recommends that when guardsman are wearing their Revolutionary War uniforms that they forego wearing any medals. When in your Revolutionary War uniform you are representing and honoring the memory of your patriot ancestor, who predates medals. You are not displaying your own achievements. On the following two pages we have shown all the SAR's medals in the order of precedence.

As a compatriot of the Sons of the American Revolution you are representing the Society and should make every effort to conform to these requirements.

The Declaration of Independence was an Act of Treason!

The Founding Fathers were well aware that they were putting their lives in jeopardy once they signed the Declaration of Independence. This was an act of treason, which could send them to the King's gallows. Even the

act of sending personal letters criticizing the king, or being caught with questionable letters in one's possession could send a man to the gallows. No one was more aware of that than Massachusetts patriot Samuel Adams.

Sam Adams celebrated the declaration of independence in a way that demonstrates the gravity of what had been done. He had been an agitator of American Independence since the 1760's. He had sat patiently through all the

debates of the Spring and the Summer in Philadelphia of 1776 - - and when the Declaration of Independence was finally agreed upon, and signed he knew he had accomplished his dream. On the 8th of July, 1776, in Philadelphia the city exploded with the news. Bonfires were burning, church bells were ringing, and people were

cheering all over town. Sam Adams walked back to his boarding house, Mrs. Yard's on Arch Street, and took up a bundle of letters he had received from friends and patriots down the years. These were letters which could be used as

evidence and get his friends hung for treason if they ever fell into the hands of the British.

Adams spent a long time with a pair of scissors, snipping those letters into tiny bits. He opened his second-story window, so that he could look down on the chaos in the street below, and quite thoughtfully and quietly, he let those little bits of paper fly by the handsful and fluttered down on the celebration - - confetti for a new nation.

On December 12th Adams wrote his friend James Warren and began this letter: "My dear Sir, As I keep no Copies of my Letters, you must excuse me if I sometimes make Repetitions." Ironically, he goes on in the letter to describe enemy troop movements and to assert the cause for patriotism - certainly another act of treason.

ship rolls list 149,000 Compatriots. Station in life is not a factor for SAR membership. However, the SAR is justly proud of our Compatriots that have become or are, Presidents of the United States of America. The importance of the Presidency of the United States has dramatically increased since George Washington, our first President. We would like to think that the patriotic ideals and

declared goals of the Society had some

influence on the decisions these

Presidents made. Since our founding, in 1875, seventeen Presidents of the United States have been or are members of George W. Bush the SAR. Unfortunately, as a Society we have no provisions for honorary membership, hence Presidents John F. Kennedy and Ronald W. Reagan who did not have the necessary

He passed away before the SAR was founded, but his membership in the Sons of Revolutionary War Sires would have automatically transferred his membership into the SAR, hence his inclusion in the roster of Presidents of the United States.
