The President's Message

Compatriots!

In early July, 19 members plus numerous spouses enjoyed the 126th Congress of the Sons of the American Revolution in Boston, one of the most history-rich cities of the American Revolution. Everyone that attended had the opportunity to explore many historical sites. On Saturday, we toured Lexington and Concord which was very enjoyable. There was also a tour of Adams Home and the U.S.S. Constitution ("Old Ironsides") on Wednesday. The Freedom Trail offered many of us the opportunity to walk the 2.5 mile trail marked in red on the sidewalks. It includes Kings Chapel, the Old South Meeting House, the Boston Massacre Site, the Old North Church, the famous Paul Revere bronze statue, Revere's home, and Bunker Hill, just to name a few. The weather was ideal. We did not face the high humidity that we were warned about, making the touring outside even more pleasant.

We want to congratulate John Dodd and Stephen Renouf for becoming Minutemen, the highest honor the Society can bestow on an individual. Congratulations also to Karl Jacobs who was named SAR Color Guardsman of the year. California was awarded the Admiral Furlong Streamer, thanks to the chapters that presented flag certificates last year. Let's do it again this year--at least one flag certificate presented per chapter before December 31. 22 of California's 26 chapters received Partners in Patriotism certificates. Great Job! Patriot Ancestor Biography Streamers were presented to the Delta, Eagle, Monterey Bay, Redlands, and Riverside Chapters. Congratulations also to California's national Youth Contest winners. Lucia, sponsored by the Gold Country Chapter, won 1st place in the National elementary school poster contest, chaired nationally by Dave Gilliard. Theora, sponsored by the Redlands Chapter, won 2nd place in the middle school brochure entry contest, chaired nationally chaired by Tom Adams.

We elected our new national officers for 2016-17 including President General J. Michael Tomme Sr., Secretary General Larry Guzy, Treasurer General Warren Alter, and Chaplain General Lou Carlson. John Dodd was elected to the Foundation Board. Jim Faulk-inbury was sworn in as VPG Western District. PG Tomme threw down a challenge to all the states to raise \$1000 to contribute to the Youth Programs as a whole so the cash awards can be increased. If California's chapters contribute \$50 to \$100 each we can easily achieve this goal. We will be seeking donations for the national youth programs at the November BOM with

Our speaker at the Saturday banquet will be Dr. Dee Andrews, with her topic being Benjamin Franklin and how his image has changed over time.

JUNIOR MEMBERSHIP ADVANTAGES

- Junior members automatically become regular members after their 18th birthday simply by paying full dues, even if their membership lapsed during the intervening years.
- May join under the family plan mentioned above. Could also be eligible for the reduced fee when using an acceptable, previously approved DAR or SAR application.


After the wreath laying, there are two options:

From the Desk of the CASSAR Registrar

Compatriots as we have reached the halfway mark of the year we are at a greater pace of applications (213), both new, junior and supplemental than last year (185). Your hard work is paying off. Interest in ancestry of the American Revolution still seems to be keeping at a good pace.

On the flip side of the coin, however we are back up to around 10 weeks processing at National, not counting supplementals. Keep the faith.

Many of you have taken the plunge into the new online application process. With a few exceptions I believe it is going pretty well. New to the abilities of the online application process is the ability for you to notify me that you have an app ready, and before you print it up, you can notify me to look it over. In a few instances I was able to recommend a modification to the app. Jim Faulkinbury, Terry Briggs and myself can even go into your work and modify it online prior to printing thusly avoiding delays. The transition has not been as smooth as one would anticipate, but given a bit of time we will soon have a data base much like the DAR has.

By the end of the year I am hoping to see all applications being completed online and all chapters onboard..

I am still seeing some of the old habits occurring on preparation of the supporting documents such as not printing census as full pages and blurry pages being submitted. A reminder too, when submitting a transcript of a document please submit a copy of the original.

With the help of the State Genealogist and Jim Faulkinbury our pended app numbers are smaller than they have ever been. The turnaround time on these situations is critical. If you get an email that you have a pended app, which I usually notify you the same day I receive it, I am not saying drop everything but action quickly keeps us on the right path.

We have a long way to go, and a short time to get there! Bravo Zulu to you Chapter Registrars.

Honoring Our Veterans

The United States of America 50th Anniversary of the Vietnam War Commemoration Commemorative Partner Program



The California Society, SAR joined in a 3 year program (2016 - 2018) with The United States of America 50th Anniversary of the Vietnam War Commemoration Commemorative Partner Program to conduct events and activities that will recognize Vietnam Veterans and their families' service, valor, and sacrifice. Our primary emphasis is objective one.

- 1. To thank and honor veterans of the Vietnam War, including personnel who were held as prisoners of war or listed as missing in action, for their service and sacrifice on behalf of the United States and to thank and honor the families of these veterans.
- 2. To highlight the service of the Armed Forces during the Vietnam War and the contributions of Federal agencies and governmental and non-governmental organizations that served with, or in support of, the Armed Forces.
- 3. To pay tribute to the contributions made on the home front by the people of the United States during the Vietnam War.

Living United States veterans who served on active duty in the United States Armed Forces at any time during the period of November 1, 1955 to May 15, 1975, regardless of location, are eligible to receive a lapel pin.

During the 141st Annual Meeting of the Membership Public Service Awards Luncheon compatriot military veterans and their spouses were presented lapel pins commemorating the 50th anniversary of the Vietnam War. The Sons of the American Revolution will to continue to present lapel pins until 2018.

The Greatest Generation

"The Greatest Generation" is the generation who grew up in the United States during the deprivation of the Great Depression, and then went on to fight in World War II, as well as those whose productivity within the war's home front made a decisive material contribution to the war effort.

In this issue we continue to honor "The Greatest Generation" for their military service and their membership in the Sons of the American Revolution.



We met 88 year old John Hinck and his wife Lorraine during a chance encounter. John is a career United States Marine Corp veteran. He served from 1945 until 1977.

During World War II John served in China and was a member of the occupation forces in Japan following the war.

On September 15, 1950, during the Korean War, John was a member of the U.S. Marines force that made a surprise amphibious landing at the strategic Port of Inchon, on the west coast of Korea. John also took part in a brutal 17-day battle in freezing weather during the period between 27 November and 13 December 1950. That battle came to be known as the Battle of Chosin Reservoir.

About 15 years later John served two tours of duty in Vietnam during the war there. Although Mr. Hinck is not a member of the SAR we were honored to present him with a 50th Anniversary of the Vietnam War Commemorative Lapel Pin.

John and Lorraine live in Huntington Beach, CA.

In Memorium

Yosemite Chapter compatriot Edwin Hugh Waldron Jr. - Pearl Harbor Survivor Biography.

Ed was born July 6, 1919 in Welch, West Virginia. He passed away quietly in Fresno, April 1, 2016.

Ed joined the United States Navy in 1940. His first and only duty station was Pearl Harbor. He was attached to the USS Litchfield (DD-336), a destroyer, prior to being sent to NAS Moffitt Field in California for flight training then spent the remainder of the war attached to a B-26 squadron on Ford Island.

After the war, Ed was discharged near Vallejo, CA and went to Inglewood, CA. He went to radio school near USC. Ed married Inez May Frazier who



was also a Navy veteran. They moved to La Habra, in Orange County, California where Ed worked as a lithographer, printer, and estimator until 1965 when he started his own business.

Ed and May retired in 1978 and moved to their desert home in Yucca Valley. In 1990 they moved to Madera where they spent the remainder of their years. Ed was a member of the Pearl Harbor Survivors Association and the Sons of the American Revolution, Yosemite Chapter.

Ed's wife of 54 years preceded him in death. A graveside service was held April 8, 2016 at the San Joaquin National Cemetery, Santa Nella, California.

With Pearl Harbor survivors well into their 90s and some passing the century mark, their numbers are shrinking all over the United States. How many of the 60,000 or so survivors are left? Nobody seems to know, exactly. On December 7, 2014, 2,000 to 2,500 survivors were thought to be still alive, according to Eileen Martinez, chief of interpretation for the USS Arizona Memorial. "They are in their twilight years, so now is the time to honor them and thank them for their service," she told the Reuters news agency last year.



SONS OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION DAY

April 8, 1989

WHEREAS, on October 22, 1875 in the offices of Dr. James L. Cogswell in San Francisco, California, a meeting was held from which the National Society of Sons of Revolutionary Sires was established; and

WHEREAS, from this beginning, the Society expanded to what is now known as the National Society of the Sons of the American Revolution created by a special act of the Congress of the United States and signed June 9, 1906 by President Theodore Roosevelt; and

WHEREAS, the goals of this Society are patriotic, historical and educational; and

WHEREAS, since the California Society takes its origin from the initial Society, the annual meeting being held on April 8, 1989 is its 114th meeting; it is being held in the City of Long Beach;

NOW, THEREFORE, I, ERNIE KELL, Mayor of the City of Long Beach, proclaim April 8, 1989 as CALIFORNIA SOCIETY SONS OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION DAY in Long Beach to honor the memory of those patriots who, by their services or sacrifices during the War of the American Revolution, helped achieve independence for the American People.

Flag Certificate Presentations to the Historic Twenty-one California Missions

In 1776 the United States Declaration of Independence was written to declare the East Coast free from British control. 3,000 miles away on the West Coast Spaniards sought to claim the lands by building 21 missions from 1769 to 1823. California's 21 Missions are a fraction of over 100 missions that were built in North America.

Mission San Luis Rey de Francia

Mission San Luis Rey de Francia is a former Spanish mission in an unincorporated part of San Diego County, surrounded by the present-day city of Oceanside, California.

The Eagle Chapter presented a SAR Flag Certificate to Mission San Luis Rey de Francia on Saturday, June 4, 2016.

Mission San Juan Capistrano

Mission San Juan Capistrano was a Spanish mission in colonial Las Californias. Its ruins are located in present-day San Juan Capistrano, Orange County, California.

Mission San Juan Capistrano was completed November 1, 1776 during the American Revolutionary War Era. It became the seventh of twenty-one missions to be founded in Alta California.

The miracle of the "Swallows" of Capistrano takes place each year at Mission San Juan Capistrano, on March 19th, St. Joseph's Day. A California landmark and cultural icon as well as a destination for travelers, the faithful and school children from all over California and the world at large.



The Irvine Ranch Chapter, DAR donated two United States flags to Mission San Juan Capistrano; a 31star US flag located in the model room

(Gold Rush display) represents the addition of a star for California star when California became a state September 9, 1850 and a second larger 50-star US post flag (10 feet hoist by 20 feet fly) was donated to the mission after remodeling and preserving the front of the mission in July 2015. During the reconstruction the mission lost their flag pole. The

option to purchase the large US flag was offered and the Irvine Ranch Chapter was thrilled to promote patriotism by donation of the large flag that hangs at the end of the Sala building. In 2015 the Irvine Ranch Chapter also sponsored a NSDAR \$10,000 grant to help preserve the Sala building. The \$10,000 grant is the largest grant that NSDAR offers to help promote education, patriotism, and/or historic preservation.

Mission San Gabriel Arcangel

The Mission San Gabriel Arcangel is a fully functioning Roman Catholic mission and a historic landmark in San Gabriel, California. The settlement was founded by Spaniards of the Franciscan order on "The Feast of the Birth of Mary," September 8, 1771, as the fourth of what would become 21 Spanish missions in California.

Mission La Purisima Concepcion



Founded in 1787, the La Purisima Mission Concepcion land holdings once covered nearly 470 square miles. Bordered by the Santa Maria River in the North and the Gaviota coastline in the South, the land was home to the Chumash people and Spanish settlers. The mission was best known for its hides and blankets, and at its peak inhabitants herded as many as 24,000 cattle and sheep. The mission is located within La Purisima Mission State Park, near Lompoc, CA.



Mission Santa Ines



Mission Santa Inés is a Spanish mission in the present-day city of Solvang, California, and named after St. Agnes of Rome.

Founded on September 17, 1804 by Father Estévan Tapís of the Franciscan order, the mission site was chosen as a midway point between Mission Santa Barbara and Mission La Purísima Concepción, and was designed to relieve overcrowding at those two missions and to serve the Indians living east of the Coast Range.

Mission San Buenaventura

Mission San Buenaventura is a Spanish mission founded by the Franciscans in present-day Ventura, California.



Franciscan priest Junipero Serra raised the Cross at "la playa de la canal de Santa Barbara" (the beach of the Santa Barbara Channel) on Easter Morning, March 31, 1782. Padre Serra was canonized a Saint by Pope Francis on September 23, 2015.

Mission to San Buenaventura had been planned as the third in the chain of twenty-one Missions founded by Padre Serra but was destined to be the ninth and last founded during his lifetime, and one of six he personally dedicated.

On August 12, 2016 members of the General George S. Patton, Jr. Chapter presented a SAR Flag Certificate to the Mission San Buenaventura.

The Massachusetts Society hosted the 126th Annual SAR Congress at the Westin Copley Place in Boston from July 8 to July 14, 2016. The California Society was represented by President Ron Barker, Vice President General John Dodd, Executive Vice President Jim Fosdyck, Treasurer Jim Klingler, Trustee Kent Gregory, Past President Jim Faulkinbury, Past President Rev. Lou Carlson, Past President Stephen Renouf, Past President Karl Jacobs, Past President Bob Ebert, Past President Charles Lampman, Tom Adams, Arnold Burr, Dave Gillard, Peter Hefler, Dan McKelvie, and Ray Raser.

On Friday afternoon, July 8, we walked down the street to the Boston Duck Tours pickup location. We boarded the World War II-style amphibious landing craft "Duck Boats" and set off on our tour of Boston. Among the sites we saw were the Boston Common, the State House, the Museum of Science, Faneuil Hall, the Quincy Market, and the Cheers Bar. We went into the Charles River at the North Bank Bridge and cruised under the Longfellow Bridge and along the Charles River Esplanade.

On Saturday morning, July 9, we boarded buses for the battlefield tour. We went to the Lexington Green, and were led on a walking tour of the area. We saw the Captain Parker statue, given to the town of Lexington in 1899, and the site of the first three meeting houses in Lexington (built in 1692, 1713 and 1794). We saw the site of the Old Belfry, from which was rung the alarm on April 19, 1775. We saw the monument erected in 1799 memorializing the martyrs at Lexington in 1775. We ended our walking tour at the historic Buckman Tavern, built around 1709, and headquarters of the Lexington militiamen in 1775. We had a boxed lunch at the Lexington Historical Society.

We went to the Lexington Visitors' Center at the Minute Man National Historical Park. We learned about the British march from Boston to Concord to seize the guns and powder from the colonials. The road from Boston to Concord was known as Battle Road, and the Americans harassed the British soldiers on the retreat to Boston. We visited Concord, and saw the Paul Revere Capture Site, where his midnight ride came to an end on April 19, 1775. Paul Revere's traveling companion, Dr. Samuel Prescott, escaped the British, and brought the alarm to Concord.

On arriving in Concord, we walked to the Old North Bridge, and saw the monument erected in 1836: HERE, On the 19th of April 1775 was made the first forcible resistance to British aggression. On the opposite Bank stood the American Militia. Here stood the Invading Army and on this spot the first of the Enemy fell in the War of that Revolution which gave Independence to these United States .In gratitude to GOD and In the love of Freedom this Monument was erected AD 1836.





On Tuesday morning, July 12 the SAR Congress reconvened, and Mike Scroggins gave a report on the new SAR website roll out. The events manager used to make reservations for national events will soon be available for state societies to use. There will be a donor module to track compatriot donations to various SAR programs. There will be a dues module, so members can pay their dues and money will be transmitted to the appropriate societies. Mike also reported on the plan to scan SAR applications. FamilySearch has offered to provide volunteers to scan old applications and incorporate them into a genealogical research system on our website. The SAR will need to provide staff or volunteers to prepare the documents for scanning, which will be done at SAR Headquarters. There was a motion to move forward with negotiations with FamilySearch, and there were many comments about how the data will be secured, and how people will be given the opportunity to opt out. The motion was approved by Congress. There was a motion to raise the dues by \$2, but it failed. The dues were adopted at the current amounts.

Elections were held for vice presidents general, and the slate, which included Jim Faulkinbury as VPG of the Western District, was elected. The slate of trustees for the various state societies were also elected, including Kent Gregory (CA-trustee), Ron Barker (CA-alternate trustee), Bob Ebert (Mexico-trustee), Rev. Lou Carlson (Mexico-alternate trustee), and Stephen Renouf (Spain-trustee).

Those running unopposed were national office: President General Mike Tomme' (GA), Secretary General Larry Guzy (GA), Chancellor General Davis Wright (DE), Genealogist General John Sinks (DC), Registrar General Russell DeVenney (MO), Historian General John Manning (NH), Librarian General Bruce Pickette (AL), Surgeon General Dr. Larry Leslie (KY), and Chaplain General Rev. Carlson (CA). There was a contested race for treasurer general between Warren Alter and Randy Ellis. John Dodd and PG Stephen Leishman were elected to the SAR Foundation Board. In the afternoon balloting was held for the contested race for treasurer general between Warren Alter and Randy Ellis. In the evening it was announced that Warren Alter was elected as treasurer general.
