

2014 Public Safety Awards

In our daily lives, we as citizens and the public in general, go about our business with little anxiety or fear without really thinking about it. Our activities interact with a multitude of others who generally feel the same way and our progress is basically unimpeded. Of course it is no accident that we feel this way. We have designed our society with built in assurances that we can perform our activities with little hindrance. In the event of an emergency, the community has requested individuals, as a group or solitarily, to take on the tasks that the public cannot or will not perform. It is to these members of our society we are truly grateful.

We, as an organization, on an annual basis make the hard decision to single out individuals from many deserving potential recipients for special recognition for their dedication and contributions for the year. Although we only see them occasionally, they are here for us twenty four hours a day and all year long.

This year, 2014, was like all previous years that we experienced from our public safety personnel. There were individuals who performed their service to the community valiantly and loyally beyond our expectations. Unlike many years of recognition, 2014 proved to be a year of great loss and the community continues to mourn the passing of two of our bravest and most respected heroes. Although we all acknowledge the risk involved in public safety, the reality of the job couldn't be more visible this year and for this reason we are recognizing these Americans for their dedication and bravery.

The City of Newport Beach employs 200 lifeguards, 80 of which are seasonal employees. The beaches in Newport experiences approximately10,000,000 visitors each year. Newport lifeguards make 3000-5000 rescues annually. During the year the guards also make approximately 250,000 public contacts and perform between 4000-7000 medical aids.

Among the city's fleet of vehicles and equipment are three rescue boats. Some of the duties include inside surfline rescue, boating rescues and assists and safety awareness. The Newport Lifeguards make more public contacts than any other department in the city of Newport Beach.

Ben Carlson

Ben Carlson was born in 1982 and grew up in Alta Loma, California. His passion was to visit Newport Beach every summer as a child. His love of the water was evident of his interest in competitive swimming, water polo, and surfing while growing up. His enthusiasm and dedication to the water locked him into a position on UCI's water polo team where he excelled while attending college.

Ben started working as a lifeguard for the City of Newport Beach at 16 years old and spent the entire summer in Newport Beach as he worked. He was known to the other guards as one of their top swimmers and athletes. Ben was familiar with all aspects of lifeguarding including the particular tides, swells, and currents in specific and infamous parts of the Newport coast. These areas included the world famous "Wedge", "The Point", Corona Del Mar, and all of the 7 miles of beach included in his duties. Not to be excluded was his teaching of the Junior Life Guards about the ocean and personal mentoring of his younger peers.

On July 6, 2014, there was unusually high surf from residual hurricane weather pounding the Newport coast. There was high danger to swimmers and beach goers. Ben was assigned to Sea Watch 2, one of Newport's three rescue boats. The boat was patrolling the surf line at "the Point" when a swimmer in distress was spotted. Sea Watch 2 positioned itself within the 15 foot swells to afford the rescue. With its transom facing the shore, Ben entered the large waves to bring the swimmer to safety. During the rescue a large set of waves consumed both swimmers. Ben did not resurface after one of the powerful waves passed over him. Ben became the first line of duty loss in the 100 year history of Newport Beach. The distressed swimmer did survive.

It is with deep respect that we recognize Ben Carlson for his selfless dedication to duty and for the bravery he displayed during circumstances that most individuals would reject due to the danger. Timothy D. Mitchell

Just off the Southern California Coast lies the destination for over a million annual visitors. Sightseers, fishermen, boaters, divers, cruise ships, athletes, adventurers, scientists, and more, travel to this Pacific Ocean gem approximately 30 miles off the coast. The common denominator for the visitors is the ocean surrounding this California isle. The approximate 4000 permanent residents on Santa Catalina Island have not only become the caretakers of the Island and its waters but of the fluctuating seasonal population.

Avalon is no different than our best American cities. Avalon has not only the normal duties needed to run the infrastructure of an American city but the added challenges that mother nature's ocean has to offer. One of the expected challenges is bad weather and storms in the winter. As all emergencies, the reason we have our first responders and safety personnel is for the unforeseen. On the night of December 30, 2014, the unforeseen happened when a Nor' Easter unexpectantly hit Avalon Bay.

The surprise storm caught the bay with a vengeance seldom seen. The morethan- usual visiting boats were moored on the cans as the boaters were preparing for the popular annual New Year's celebration ashore. The wind whipped through the harbor generating large and formidable waves. The storm waves crashed ashore carrying boats, debris and moorings to the beach and sea wall. There were people trapped on their boats. The larger boats on the outside were breaking loose and taking the boats and moorings on the inside to the beach. Tim, performing his job as a Harbor Patrol skipper, boarded one of the larger and well known Catalina boats known as the King Neptune. Tim's goal was to get the boat out of the harbor in order to prevent it from taking out the smaller boats and boaters on the inside moorings. The large waves and surge as well as the debris and mooring lines trapped the King Neptune inside and sent the large boat ashore where it was shattered by the relentless surf and Tim was lost in the beaching of the King Neptune. Tim was born January 30, 1975 in New Zealand. He moved to Avalon from New Zealand 13 years ago. He was an accomplished diver and found his niche as a Diving Instructor and Licensed skipper. He loved Avalon and its people. His love of his new home and residents motivated Tim to become a reserve fireman for Avalon. As most of us know, people are not the only heroes in our midst. We often hear of animals and pets contributing to the safety and rescuing of humans. Today we are recognizing P.B., also known as Pretty Boy, for his loyalty and courage under the worst of conditions in his attempt to save his best friend and companion.

WHISTLEBLOWER POLICY

It is the responsibility of all CASSAR Officers, CASSAR Investment Fund Trustees and CASSAR Committee members to observe the highest standards of business and personal ethics in the conduct of their duties and responsibilities, to comply with the Conflict of Interest/Code of Organizational Conduct Policy and to report violations or suspected violations in accordance with this policy. No CASSAR Officer, CASSAR Investment Fund Trustee or CASSAR Committee member who in good faith reports a violation shall suffer harassment or retaliation to the extent such harassment or retaliation shall occur. A CASSAR Officer, CASSAR Investment Fund Trustee or CASSAR Committee member who retaliates against someone who has reported a violation in good faith is subject to discipline up to and including review by the Ethics Committee. An open door policy exists so that CASSAR Officer, CASSAR Investment Fund Trustee or CASSAR Committee members can share their questions, concerns, suggestions or complaints with someone who can address them properly. In most cases, the CASSAR President or his designee is in the best position to address an area of concern. However, if a CASSAR Officer, CASSAR Investment Fund Trustee or CASSAR Committee member is not comfortable speaking with the CASSAR President or his designee or the CASSAR Officer, CASSAR Investment Fund Trustee or CASSAR Committee member is not satisfied with the response provided, the CASSAR Officer, CASSAR Investment Fund Trustee or CASSAR Committee member is encouraged to speak with the Chairman of the Ethics Committee, CASSAR Officer, CASSAR Investment Fund Trustee or CASSAR Committee member are required to report suspected violations of the Conflict of Interest/Code of Organizational Conduct Policy to the Chairman of the Ethics Committee, whose committee has specific and exclusive responsibility to investigate all reported violations on behalf of the CASSAR President. For suspected fraud, or when a CASSAR Officer, CASSAR Investment Fund Trustee or CASSAR Committee member is not satisfied or uncomfortable with following the open door policy, the CASSAR Officer, CASSAR Investment Fund Trustee or CASSAR Committee member should contact the Chairman of the Ethics Committee directly.

THE CALIFORNIA SOCIETY OF THE SONS OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION (CASSAR)

CONFLICT OF INTEREST/CODE OF ORGANIZATIONAL CONDUCT

SECTION 1. PURPOSE:

The California Society of the Sons of the American Revolution (known hereafter as CASSAR) is a not for profit, tax-exempt organization. Maintenance of its tax-exempt status is important for both continued financial stability, public and member support. Therefore, the Internal Revenue Service, as well as other regulatory agencies, tax officials and other stakeholders view the policy and operations of the SAR as a public trust, which is subject to scrutiny by and accountable to such authorities as well as its constituents.

Consequently, there does exist between the CASSAR and its officers, trustees, committee chairmen, and the general public a fiduciary duty that carries with it a broad and clear duty to fidelity and loyalty. The officers, trustees, and committee chairmen have the responsibility to administer the affairs in an honest and prudent manner, exercising the best skill, abilities and judgment for the sole benefit of the CASSAR. Those persons who serve in leadership capacities shall exercise good faith in all matters and transactions, and shall refrain from practices that allow personal gain or benefit due to knowledge or influence. The interest of the SAR shall be the priority in all decision and actions.

SECTION 2. PERSONS CONCERNED:

This code and statement is intended for all general officers, trustees, committee chairmen, and others as so determined by the board of managers of the CASSAR. All persons who may influence decisions of the CASSAR may be added at any time.

SECTION 3. AREAS OF POTENTIAL CONFLICT:

Conflicts may arise in relations to officers, trustees, and committee chairmen with any of the following third parties:

- 1. Persons and firms supplying goods and services to the CASSAR
- 2. Persons and firms from whom the CASSAR leases property or equipment.
- 3. Persons and firms with whom the CASSAR is maintaining or plans to maintain a business relationship that involves the sale of real estate, securities, or other property.
- 4. Competing or affinity organizations.
- 5. Donors and others supporting the CASSAR.
- 6. Agencies, organizations, and associations that affect the operations of the CASSAR.
- 7. Family members, close associates and other employees.

SECTION 4. NATURE OF CONFLICT OF INTEREST:

A conflicting interest may be defined as an interest, direct or indirect, with any person or firms mentioned in Section 3. Such interest may arise from the following activities:

- 1. Owning stock or holding debt or other proprietary interests in a third party dealing with the CASSAR.
- 2. Holding office, serving on the board, participation in management, or being otherwise employed or previously employed with any third party who conducts business or intends

to conduct business with the CASSAR.

- 3. Receiving remuneration for services with respect to individual transactions involving the CASSAR.
- 4. Using the time, personnel, equipment, good will or other resources of the CASSAR for activities other than approved activities, programs and functions.
- 5. Receiving personal gifts, professional opportunities or loans from third-party vendors conducting business or intending to conduct business with the CASSAR. Receipt of any gift of cash is prohibited. Gifts with a value of less than \$25 (twenty-five dollars) may be accepted only if the acceptance avoids a discourtesy.

SECTION 5. INTERPRETATION OF POLICY:

The areas of conflicting interest listed in Sections 3 and 4 are examples of potential conflicts and may be expanded as situations dictate. All persons who serve in leadership and critical areas of the CASSAR shall use best judgment to determine any possible conflicts. The CASSAR Chancellor shall be consulted on any question of this policy.

Persons in leadership positions of the CASSAR shall disclose any potential conflict before transactions are consummated. The leadership shall scrutinize all transactions and disclose any activities that are, or have the appearance of, a conflict to the board of managers immediately upon knowledge of such activities.

This policy, once enacted, shall be mandatory for all affected members. Any change of the policy will require a two-thirds affirmative vote of the Board of Managers of the CASSAR. Such vote will occur at the Annual Meeting, or a Board of Managers Meeting.

SECTION 6. DISCLOSURE POLICY AND PROCEDURE:

Transactions with parties with whom a conflicting interest exists may only be undertaken when all four (4) of stipulations are met:

The conflict of interest is fully disclosed.

The person with the conflict refrains from discussion and approval of such transaction.

A competitive bid or comparable valuation exists.

The leadership, executive committee, board of managers, or duly constituted committee determines that the transaction serves the best interest of the CASSAR.

Disclosure shall be made to the CASSAR President (Executive Vice President if the President is the person in conflict) and the Chancellor, who shall bring the matter to the Board of Managers for discussion and resolution.

The duly constituted committee shall determine whether a conflict exists. Further, the constituted body shall determine in a fair, just, and reasonable manner if the approval of such transaction with the disclosed conflict best serves the interest and mission of the CASSAR.







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THE PATRIOT MEDAL

The Patriot Medal is issued only by a state society. It is the highest award given for service at the state or chapter level. This medal is presented only once. It represents long, faithful and outstanding service at the state or chapter level.

THE DISTINGUISHED SERVICE MEDAL

The State Medal of Distinguished Service, authorized in 1998, is the highest medal that can be awarded by a state society president. A state president may present only one Medal of Distinguished Service during each year of his tenure as state society president. The medal is presented to a Compatriot for distinguished service rendered to the state society on the state level during a state society's president's term of office.

THE DAUGHTERS OF LIBERTY MEDAL

The Daughters of Liberty Medal, authorized in 1992, may be presented by the national society, a state society, or chapter to a lady recommended by any officer of a chapter, state or national society, SAR in appreciation for her unselfish devotion, tireless efforts, and assistance to the SAR, and who has dedicated her time, energy, ability and/or finances to the organization in support and furtherance of the stated objectives of the National Society SAR. The medal is considered second in importance only to the SAR medal awards to ladies.
