California Society State Secretary Annual Report

January 1, 2020 to December 31, 2020

Reporting Date; March 31, 2021 Submitted by: California State Secretary Frederick Schuster

Summary:

The 2020 annual year has been an extremely busy year for the California State Secretary as there have been several projects that the secretary has worked on to help make the position less time consuming, however the position still demands fifty (50) plus hours a week to keep pace with all the activities required of the position.

The society now has a master numbering system, where almost every number issued from the very first number to the current number that was assigned to a CASSAR Member has been identified. All duplications of CASSAR numbers have been removed from the California State roster. In 2019 there were 234 anomalies in the state roster with many members sharing a duplicate state number as there was no cross-check procedure in place to ensure that a number was not issued more than once.

During 2020, the California Society has a completed a project and now has a complete compliment of Record Copies of all members going back to 1995, with the exception of about 80 members; these 80 Record Copies appear to be from transfer members or are from Dual members where a Record Copy was not required. The California Society Secretary now requires that all members requesting Dual Sate Membership or are transferring their membership into the California society, submit a Record Copy along with their application for membership.

The challenge is to now assign a number to all Dual Members and get Record Copy's for the CASSAR files and to complete the Record Copy files back to 1995 so that the holes in the Record Copy system can be filled. In mid-February the California Society Secretary requested Record copies for all Dual Members from NSSAR so a California number could be issued and the Record Copy could be entered into the CASSAR Record Copy Data Base. If a transfer member does not provide a copy of his Record copy or does not have one, the California Society Secretary will order one for the member at cost the cost that NSSAR the California Society to order the Record Copy.

The California Patriot system will have a complete set of California Record Copies going back to 1985, the California Secretary would like to have a full complement of CASSAR Record Copy's to coincide with the NSSAR Patriot Research System in our CASSAR Data Base for our members to draw on if necessary, to have save time and money and to provide a valuable service to or membership. The Record Copies are on disc and will need to be copies and scanned individually as time permits.

The Record Copies for Supplemental applications is not as complete for a variety of reasons, however a complete set of supplemental Record Copies dating back to 2019 and many prior to this date have been entered into the California System.

The California Society nominated several members for Emeritus status in 2020 and we will continue to look for members that qualify for this distinction. The California Society currently has seventeen (17) Emeritus members.

A format to enter information into the Master Roster and the yearly CASSAR roster has been standardized to make data entry faster and easier for the secretary.

All the CASSAR data that had been stored on multiple jump drives has been consolidated onto one external hard drive for easy storage and retrieval, making the entry of data much faster for the state secretary and easier to find.

In 2020 the California Society State Secretary has focused on cleaning the membership files and reconciling the state records with the chapters and the NSSAR.

In 2020, the California Society completed the first part of the state's reconciliation report on time for the first time in many years. The state reconciled membership, to the member and to the penny, I am happy to report to the society, due to the hard work of all the chapters the CASSAR Reconciliation Reporting process was completed by February 19, 2021 and normal activities could resume.

The California Society had 1,620 members on January 1, 2020 and on December 31, 2020 the California Society membership was 1,916, however, on January 1, 2021 after the 2021 dues campaign the California Society Membership dropped to 1,652, showing a net gain in membership of 32 members, which were primarily transfers and reinstated members.

During 2020, the state secretary processed 296 new member transactions which consisted of transfers, reinstalments, and new members. The state secretary processed 264 losses for the year, which included resignations, dropped members and transfers. In addition, the state secretary processed 84 supplemental applications, 3 memorial applications and 31 death notices.

During 2021 the California Secretary will continue to find ways to streamline the position and reduce the number of hours required to complete the varied duties of the position. Several of the larger state societies have added an administrative position in addition to the state secretary's position to handle some of the less routine items that deal with state business such as the collection of the reports, delegates, changes in chapter management and other activities which keeping track of who does and does not send in information.

- 1. Receipts Total receipts for the year of \$117,346 were \$15,661, or 15%, over the annual budget, primarily due to: transfers from the unallocated fund \$14,760, and donations \$5,392, partially offset by lower Annual Dues Received NSSAR \$(3,520) and transfers not completed from the Education Fund \$(2,500). Major variances to budget receipts were:
 - a. Receipts for NSSAR and CASSAR regular annual dues were below budget by \$3,905 due to fewer annual members than budgeted.
 - b. Transfers from the investment account for life member dues were below budget by \$(240) due to the number of actual life members lower than budgeted..
 - c. Receipts for donations exceeded budget by \$5,392 due to an unbudgeted donation from Intel of \$4,900.

CASSAR Genealogist serves as a resource to CASSAR and chapter Registrars

The CASSAR Genealogist continues to serve and be available as a resource to CASSAR and CASSAR chapter Registrars. The CASSAR Genealogist has provided information to continuing and new chapter Registrars intended to facilitate the effective implementation of the CASSAR application process and the preparation of successful SAR applications leading to approvals of those applications.

CASSAR Pended Applications Monitoring and Reporting

In 2020 and 2021 the CASSAR Genealogist has continued monitoring and weekly reporting of the number of pended CASSAR applications. During 2020-2021 CASSAR has had, at any one time, 7 to 22 pended applications. Currently there are 18 CASSAR pended applications. CASSAR needs to continue to reduce the number of pended past applications and minimize the number of pended applications in the future. In 2020-2021 the CASSAR Genealogist published and distributed regular updates to a list of CASSAR pended applications for reference and use by the CASSAR President, the CASSAR Registrar and other CASSAR officers. The Genealogist has contacted CASSAR chapter registrars regarding pended applications from their chapters and encouraged the resolution or withdrawal of pended applications. The CASSAR Genealogist has also reviewed a number of pended applications brought to him by chapter Registrars and has provided interpretations and suggestions toward resolution or withdrawal of those pended applications. Also directed toward reducing the number of CASSAR pended applications, the Genealogist has provided reviews of draft applications online at the request of CASSAR chapter Registrars prior to finalization and submittal and provided recommendations to proceed with submittal and/or comments for additional work on applications before those applications are submitted to the CASSAR Registrar.

As a reminder to all chapter Registrars, applications that have been pended more than 3 years cannot be acted upon by the NSSAR genealogists. The chapter Registrars should instruct the CASSAR Registrar to direct the NSSAR to either shred those pended application files or to return the pended application file documentation to the chapter Registrar at the chapter's expense.

SAR Patriot Research System Implementation

The CASSAR Genealogist is also currently serving as the CASSAR SAR Patriot Research System (SAR PRS) Phase 1 Volunteers Coordinator. The SAR PRS is the SAR's current free online equivalent to the free online DAR Genealogical Research System (DAR GRS). The SAR PRS provides information about SAR patriot ancestors and post 1984 SAR member lineages to their patriot ancestors as previously documented on post 1984 SAR record copies.

100% of the approximately 7,800 total CASSAR post 1984 lineages have now been entered into the SAR PRS by about 50 CASSAR data entry volunteers over a 3 year period of time. Data entry for each lineage takes approximately 30 minutes and requires another 15

minutes to review and publish to the SAR PRS data base. SAR PRS volunteers who contribute 40 hours or more of volunteer time are awarded the SAR Lafayette Volunteer Service Medal and each additional 40 hours of volunteer time earns a bronze oak leaf for the medal.

All 24 CASSAR chapter's post 1984 record copies have been entered into the SAR PRS as Phase 1. CASSAR SAR PRS Phase 2 data entry has recently begun to update CASSAR unique Patriot Records (approximately 2,800 Patriot Records) in the SAR PRS. This work is being coordinated by Jim Faulkinbury and Randy Dhindsa.

NSSAR Online Application Form Data Entry System use and implementation

During 2020-2021 the CASSAR Genealogist has actively used, monitored and promoted the use of the NSSAR Online Application Form Data Entry System to all CASSAR Registrars for use in the preparation of all CASSAR applications including new member and new Junior Member applications and for preparation of Memorial applications and Supplemental Patriot Ancestor applications. As of this date, all of the CASSAR chapters that submit applications for review are using the SAR Online Application System to prepare SAR application forms. The CASSAR Genealogist has also served as a resource to CASSAR chapter Registrars to answer questions about the use of the SAR Online Application System and to resolve specific user issues.

As of March 11, 2021 and since the Fall of 2015, approximately 3,250 CASSAR applications have been started in the SAR Online Application System and approximately 1,320 applications have been approved for application forms created and printed using the SAR Online Application System.


All chapter Registrars should be checking regularly their Online System "Chapter Dashboards" to view new applications started by applicants themselves in the Online System. Chapter Registrars should immediately contact applicants starting applications to provide the applicants information about the SAR, the SAR application process, the SAR application requirements and to provide coordination and guidance for completing and submitting SAR applications to published SAR application standards. It appears that a number of CASSAR chapters are not regularly checking applicant started applications in the SAR Online Application System.

SAR Applications Must be Closely Reviewed by Chapter Registrars

Before applications are submitted to the CASSAR Registrar to begin the application review process, chapter Registrars should perform a thorough review and verification of <u>all</u> applications, new <u>and supplemental</u>, to confirm that the applications are complete and conform to published SAR application standards, to confirm that the correct check amounts accompany the applications, that there is SAR acceptable supporting documentation to confirm all child-to-parent relationships in the direct ancestral line from the applicant to their patriot ancestor and that there is SAR acceptable supporting documentation to confirm the patriotic service of the Revolutionary War patriot ancestor.

Chapter registrars should take the time to become very familiar with the most current NSSAR Genealogy Committee Policies Manual and the most current NSSAR Application Preparation Manual, both of which can easily be downloaded from the NSSAR web-site. Registrars should carefully review and understand the Genealogy Committee Policies. With the cooperation of all CASSAR chapter Registrars, the CASSAR should see a reduction in CASSAR pended applications in the future.

Report to the Annual Meeting of the California Society, SAR April 17, 2021

Amendments of Bylaws.

Bylaw 8, $\S4(b)(iv)$

At annual or board of managers meetings properly noticed, proposed amendments to the bylaws may be voted upon with such voting restricted to one vote for each chapter president (or his designee). Passage of the proposed amendment requires at least a two-thirds vote of the chapters present and voting at the meeting.

CASSAR Bylaw Proposals – April 2021

Proposal No. 1 (Noticed to Chapter Presidents on 2/3/2021)

Bylaw 7, Section 6:

Current

Section 6— Any Regular Member in good standing after April 12, 2014, who is also a NSSAR Life Member, and who shall make payment in accordance with a fee schedule established by the Executive Board with input from the Trustees of the Investment Funds shall become a CASSAR Life Member and shall thereafter be exempt from payment of all required annual dues to the California Society and his chapter within the California Society. The one-time payment shall be added to the CASSAR LIFE MEMBERSHIP FUND and the income therefrom shall be utilized to pay the annual dues components to this society and to the chapter to which he subsequently belongs. Members of CASSAR who have previously paid for a CASSAR Life Membership prior to April 12, 2014, will continue to have their dues payments cover NSSAR, CASSAR, and their chapter dues payments. Non-CASSAR members who obtain a CASSAR Life Membership plan shall thereafter be exempt from payment of all required annual dues to the California Society and his chapter within the California Society.

Proposed

Section 6— Any Regular Member in good standing after April 12, 2014, who is also a NSSAR Life Member, and who shall make payment in accordance with a fee schedule established by the Executive Board with input from the Trustees of the Investment Funds shall become a CASSAR Life Member and shall thereafter be exempt from payment of all required annual dues to the California Society and his chapter within the California Society. The one-time payment shall be added to the CASSAR LIFE MEMBERSHIP FUND and the income therefrom shall be utilized to pay the annual dues components to this society and to the chapter (pursuant to Bylaw No. 9, Section 5, Paragraph (a)) to which he subsequently belongs. Members of CASSAR who have previously paid for a CASSAR Life Membership prior to April 12, 2014, will continue to have their dues payments cover NSSAR, CASSAR, and their chapter dues payments. Non-CASSAR members who obtain purchased a CASSAR Life Membership plan shall thereafter be exempt from payment of all required annual dues to the California Society and his chapter within the California Society.

Rationale

To clarify the amount of dues paid to the chapter as defined in Bylaw No. 9, Section 5, Paragraph (a), to remove superfluous words, and to correct "obtain" to "purchase."

The Bylaws Committee recommends approval of the proposal.

CASSAR Bylaw Proposals – April 2021

Proposal No. 2

(Noticed to Chapter Presidents on 3/15/2021)

Bylaw 2, Section 3(a):

Current

(a)—The financial statement included in the annual report for each chapter shall contain the following information for all accounts deposited with financial institutions: 1) The name and address of the financial institution; 2) The name, type and number of the financial account; 3) The date of the last statement and the account balance at that time; and 4) The names of the members or officers having signatory authority over the account.

Proposed

(a)—The financial statement included in the annual report for each chapter shall contain the following information for all accounts deposited with financial institutions: 1) The name and address of the financial institution; 2) The name, type, and number of the financial account; 3) The date of the last statement and the account balance at that time; and 4) The names of the members or officers having signatory authority over the account: and 5) An inventory of the non-cash assets held by the chapter.

Rationale

As a matter of compliance, 501(c)(3) nonprofit entities (CASSAR or Chapters) operating in the State of California are required by the Attorney General's Registry of Charitable Trusts to report our financial cash and non-cash assets (inventory). It is the fiduciary responsibility of the CASSAR when those in possession of non-cash assets change/die/move/resign/disappear or Chapter's fold, to recover those assets as we have legal requirements as to how they are to be disposed.

The California society has requested that the assets of the chapter be included into the chapters 2021 annual report, however there is no requirement in the Articles of Incorporation or in the CASSAR bylaws which require the chapters to report assets.

The insertion of one line into the California Society Bylaw No. 2 Section 3, paragraph 3 would require the reporting of the assets by the chapter and the compliance with California State 501 (c) requirements.

The Bylaws Committee recommends approval of the proposal if the reportable inventory of non-cash assets is limited to those \$500 and greater.

Proposal No. 3

(Noticed to Chapter Presidents on 3/15/2021)

Bylaw 8, Section 1(g):

Current

(g) Not less than twenty (20) days prior to the date of any annual or special meeting of the membership, the secretary shall transmit notice of the time, place and agenda thereof to each chapter secretary and to each member who, on the record date for notice of meeting is entitled to vote thereat. (Corp. Code §5511.) Notice shall be transmitted either electronically and by posting on the CASSAR website.

Proposed

(g) Not less than twenty (20) thirty (30) days prior to the date of any annual or special meeting of the membership, the secretary shall transmit notice of the time, place and agenda thereof to each chapter secretary and to each member who, on the record date for notice of meeting is entitled to vote thereat. (Corp. Code §5511.) Notice shall be transmitted either electronically and by posting on the CASSAR website.

Rationale

To reconcile the Bylaw 8 Section 1(g) with Articles of Incorporation Article XI.

The Bylaws Committee recommends approval of the proposal.

PUBLIC SERVICE AND HEROISM COMMITTEE

There are five approved awards in the PS&H category that the State Society presents semi-annually, and each Chapter is encouraged to present annually. The criteria for presentation of the five awards can be found in the NSSAR Handbook and is listed below. Chapters are <u>encouraged</u> to report award presentations using the on-line reporting form found on the NSSAR website under the Public Service and Heroism Committee heading. This information is used to produce a booklet of award recipients from each state society and is distributed at the National Congress awards luncheon. Printing costs are covered by a donation from the NASSAR George Washington Fellows.

Heroism Medal and Certificate is presented to those who demonstrate outstanding bravery and self-sacrifice in the face of imminent danger by performing acts which involve great personal courage and risk to the recipient.

Life Saving Medal and Certificate that maybe presented to honorees whose actions resulted in the saving of a human life without placing themselves in imminent danger. The medal is intended to recognize the actions of any person who was directly responsible for the saving of a human life or who prolonged a human life to the extent that the victim was still alive upon transfer to the care of medical authorities.

The Law Enforcement Commendation Medal is presented to those who have served with distinction and devotion in the field of law enforcement. The medal is intended to recognize exceptional service or accomplishment in the field of law enforcement. Eligibility is not limited to peace officers but extends to the entire range of persons who make and enforce the law to include but not limited to peace officers, attorneys, judges, prosecutors and legislators who have performed an exceptional act or service beyond that normally expected.

The Fire Safety Commendation Medal is presented to an individual for accomplishments and/or outstanding contributions in an area of fire safety and service. The award is not limited to firefighters. It may be presented to recognize a variety of fire safety and service that has evolved into a highly technical and skilled profession with constant study, development and involvement by numerous dedicated citizens with a single goal - protect human life and property by preventing injuries or casualties due to fire and chemicals.

The Emergency Medical Services Commendation Medal is presented to an individual for accomplishments and/or outstanding contribution in an area of emergency medical services. The award is intended for paramedics and certified Emergency Medical Technicians and others in the emergency medical field who have performed an act or service beyond that normally expected.



CALIFORNIA SOCIETY, SONS OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION COMMITTEE REPORT 04/02/2021 DAR LIAISON COMMITTEE

The SAR - Daughters of the American Revolution (DAR) Award is presented annually to the DAR State or International Society that recruits the highest number of new members to the Sons of the American Revolution (SAR). The competition runs from January 1 to December 31 of each year. In order to be counted, a "DAR Finder Form" must be attached to the application packet. The SAR Staff Registrar uses these forms to determine the winner. Applications without the form cannot be counted toward the competition. A separate form must be included with each application received and will be counted toward the contest after the application is approved. Multiple applications cannot be applied to one form. The DAR Finder Form is available on the CASSAR website.

The NSSAR annually awards \$1,200 in cash prizes to State DAR Societies for first (\$300), second (\$200), and third (\$100) place in two categories. The highest number of referrals; and largest percentage of referrals based on the number of state members.

The CASSAR annually awards the DAR Medal of Appreciation for 5 referrals (with an oak leaf cluster for additional batches of 5 referrals), the Martha Washington Medal for 20 referrals, and the Daughters of Liberty Medal for 50 referrals. The CASSAR also annually awards a Certificate of Appreciation and cash prize of \$100.00 to the California Society DAR Chapter that provides the highest number of referrals greater than five, that result in approved SAR member applications submitted using the DAR Finder Form.

In 2019, California tied for 5th place nationally with 32 DAR Finder Forms submitted and Linda Adams wife of the Kern Chapter Registrar Terry Adams was awarded a Martha Washington Oak Leaf Cluster for 21 Finder Forms.

In 2020, California submitted 33 Finder Forms and placed 5th nationally. The Bakersfield Chapter DAR was the winner of the \$100 cash prize and Certificate of Appreciation for 15 referrals. Plans are in the works for the CASSAR President to present the Check and Certificate to the Bakersfield Chapter DAR at their May meeting in celebration of their 100th Anniversary.

Since last year's virtual CASSAR April meeting, I have attended the virtual DAR Continental Congress in June 2020, the virtual CASDAR Conference in March 2021 and the virtual NSSAR DAR Liaison Committee held on September 25, 2020.

CASSAR Annual Meeting

March 1, 2021

The elected Trustees of the CASSAR Invested Funds are Chairman Stephen R. Renouf (2020-2023), John L. Dodd (2018-2021), and M. Kent Gregory (2019-2022). The Trustees of the Invested Funds operate under CASSAR Bylaw No. 4, Section 12.

The CASSAR Invested Funds are invested with Morgan Stanley Smith Barney (MSSB) in five separate funds: the Life Membership Fund, the Education Fund, the Permanent Fund, the Congress Fund, and the Unallocated Fund. The signers on the account are the three trustees.

The beginning value of the Invested Fund on March 1, 2020: \$431,525.01.

The ending value of the Invested Fund on February 28, 2021: \$506,187.31.

During the 12-month period described above, the total funds in the accounts increased by \$74,662.30. The increase was due to a strong stock market following the correction in February 2020, despite the Wuhan Virus pandemic.

LIFE MEMBERSHIP FUND

The purpose of the Life Membership Fund is to maintain the life memberships purchased by the regular members of this society. The Fund is invested with the goal of achieving a return of 6.1% (net of fees) to cover the national, state and chapter dues for members of the CASSAR life membership program. The principal and income from this fund shall be distributed to the treasurer annually and deposited into the general funds of the society to cover the annual dues of the life members. This fund is governed by CASSAR Bylaw No. 9, Section 5.

The purpose of the Permanent Fund is to to insure the stability and perpetuity of this society. The Permanent Fund maintains all moneys or property, real or personal, which may accrue to this society by donation, gift, devise, bequest or otherwise, unless use thereof is otherwise designated as a condition to receipt or is otherwise directed by a majority vote of the board with at least three-quarters of the members of the board present and voting. The annual income from the permanent fund shall be accumulated and one-half shall be transferred to the Unallocated Fund and one-half shall be reinvested in the Permanent Fund at the beginning of each fiscal year. This fund is governed by CASSAR Bylaw No. 9, Section 1.

RECENT ACTIVITY.

On March 6, 2020, the Morgan Stanley advisor recommended increasing our risk profiles to enhance our returns – making all funds have a Risk Profile of 4 (except the Unallocated Fund, with a Risk Profile of 3).

On April 18, 2020, the CASSAR Annual Meeting was held by Zoom Meeting. The California Society voted to approve the Risk Profile changes recommended by the Morgan Stanley advisor, subject to his recommendation as the best time to implement the changes.

On April 30, 2020, the Trustees had a conference call with the Morgan Stanley advisor to discuss the recently approved changes to the Risk Factor of the invested funds. He did not think that the market was done with volatility, and he recommended waiting. The trustees decided to wait.

On October 1, 2020, the Trustees had a conference call with the Morgan Stanley advisor to discuss changing the Risk Factor of the invested funds. There was still a lot of volatility with the lingering pandemic, and the national elections. The Trustees decided to wait until there was less volatility in the market.

The Trustees set up a call with the Advisor for March 18, 2021 to discuss increasing the risk profile approved in 2020. We will verbally report on this call at the Annual Meeting in April 2021.

Trustee Management.

Your Trustees have continued their tripartite management style and are continuing to act cautiously in management of the Invested Fund. Accordingly, the Trustees will continue to move forward with moderate to conservative management in the best interests of the Society.

Trustees' Statement.

The trustees reiterate their pledge to the membership that their activities and management of the CASSAR Invested Fund will be transparent to the membership. No actions will or have been taken by the present Trustees without the full participation of all Trustees.

Section Five

CASSAR Bylaws and CASSAR Articles of Incorporation

CALIFORNIA SOCIETY SONS OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION BYLAWS

Bylaw No. 1 MEMBERSHIP

Membership application forms and procedures, evidence of membership and designation of a member shall be as set forth in the National Society of the Sons of the American Revolution ("NSSAR") Bylaw No. 1.

Bylaw No. 2 STATE SOCIETY AND CHAPTERS

Section 1—The California Society (CASSAR or society) shall regulate all matters pertaining to its own affairs, subject to the provisions of the constitution and bylaws of the NSSAR, particularly NSSAR Bylaw No. 2. "State Societies and Chapters," sections 1 through 10.

Section 2—New chapters may be formed by petition of ten or more members of the society. After investigation, the Executive Committee may authorize the formation of a chapter. The Executive Committee shall verify that the new chapter's bylaws are consistent with those of this Society and NSSAR. If approved by the Executive Committee, a copy of the bylaws of the new chapter will be filed with the Secretary.

Section 3—Each chapter should hold not less than four (4) meetings each year including an annual meeting for the election of officers. Each chapter shall submit to the society a report of its programs during the administration year ending with its annual meeting, including a financial statement, and the additions, transfers and deaths and any other changes in membership, and such other matters as shall be required by the board, which shall be filed with the state secretary on or before March 31, and at such other times as the board may designate.

- (a)—The financial statement included in the annual report for each chapter shall contain the following information for all accounts deposited with financial institutions: 1) The name and address of the financial institution; 2) The name, type and number of the financial account; 3) The date of the last statement and the account balance at that time; and 4) The names of the members or officers having signatory authority over the account.
- (b)—Any officer of a chapter who fails to surrender records or funds to the state society on demand pursuant to section 5 below shall be immediately suspended from membership in the state society pending disposition by a committee of inquiry convened under the provision of Article X of the Restated Articles of Incorporation of the California

Society of the Sons of the American Revolution (the Articles of Incorporation). (It is a criminal offense under section 504 (Embezzlement) of the California Penal Code for an officer or an agent of a public or private corporation or association to fraudulently appropriate to any use not

in the due and lawful execution of his trust, any property which he has in his possession, or under his control by virtue of his trust, or who secretes it with a fraudulent intent to appropriate it to such use or purpose).

Section 4—A chapter may be adjudged by the board to have forfeited its charter from the society should it fail to fulfill its duties to the society and particularly should it: (1) fail without good reason to hold at least four (4) meetings in any year; (2) fail to hold an annual meeting and to elect officers; (3) fail to report to the board on the meetings as prescribed; or (4) fail to make return of and pay the monies due the society.

Section 5—Upon the cessation or closing out of a chapter of the CASSAR, all money, files, archives, properties, books, book cases, furniture, color guard uniforms, office machines (including fax machines, computers, typewriters and word processors), and other equipment shall become the property of the state society, and shall be turned over to the board. If the chapter is reinstated within two years, the money and equipment as described in a certified inventory shall be returned to the said chapter. If not reinstated, the items shall be converted or disposed of by the board for the good of the society.

(a)—Conditional Gifts—Should there be any gifts, bequests or donations that had been received by such a chapter under a written agreement that such property would be used only for a specific purpose, it shall be the responsibility of the society to continue to honor the terms of such an agreement, or obtain the consent of the donor to other uses, or return the property to the donor or the donor's legal representative. Any such conditional gifts so received by the society will be deposited by the treasurer in a restricted account, or maintained by any other officer receiving custody of such property in a segregated manner, to be used only for the purpose specified in the agreement with the donor. In no case will conditional gifts be commingled with other property of the society, or deposited in the general fund without the expressed consent of the donor.

Section 6—Without a prior written agreement to the contrary, any work done by a member for, or on behalf of the society, is the legal property of the society.

Section 7—Any member or chapter that maintains funds or property belonging to the society shall submit a status report on those assets to the chairman of the Budget and Planning Committee prior to each state meeting. At all times such state funds will be separately accounted for by the member or chapter having custody of them.

Bylaw No. 3 BOARD OF MANAGERS

Section 1—The board shall have management and control of the property and

affairs of this society and be responsible for the promotion of its objects.

Section 2—The board shall comprise the elected officers of this society and the elected president of each chapter in good standing or his designee as alternate.

Bylaw No. 4 OFFICERS, POWERS AND DUTIES

Section 1—OFFICERS—The officers of this society shall be president, immediate former president, executive vice president, two vice presidents designated vice president north and vice president south, vice president for membership, secretary, treasurer, registrar, historian, genealogist, chancellor, chaplain, surgeon and three trustees of the invested funds. Prior designation shall not change until incumbent has been replaced. They shall all serve without compensation. The officers, except the immediate former president and the vice president for membership, shall be elected at each annual meeting of the society by the delegates, and except for the trustees of the invested funds and the vice president for membership, shall hold office for one year or until their successors have been elected and qualified. The vice president for membership shall be elected, for a two-year term, and each of the trustees of the invested funds shall be elected for a three-year term, staggered such that one expires each year, except when there is more than one vacancy, in which case different terms will be required so that only one trustee term will expire each year. The term "most senior past president" shall mean the most recent former president.

Section 2—PRESIDENT—The president shall preside at all meetings of this society and of the board and have a casting vote. He shall exercise the usual functions of a presiding officer, and shall enforce strict observance of the articles of incorporation and the bylaws. He shall make the designations required by Article III, Articles of Incorporation, and shall appoint all committees not otherwise provided for. In the absence of the president at any meeting or his incapacity to continue in service for any reason, his duties shall be assumed by other officers in the following order: executive vice president, the vice president from the opposite part of the state to the executive vice president, the remaining vice president north or south, the vice president for membership, and other elected officers in order of precedence listed in section 1 above.

Section 3—VICE PRESIDENTS—Each vice president shall assist the president in such duties as he shall be assigned.

(a) The executive vice president shall function statewide and be resident of the opposite part of the state from that of the president. As president- elect, he shall be listed on the ballot but not be required to stand for

election to the office of president.

(b) The vice president north shall be resident in the northern part of the state and the vice president south shall be resident in the southern part of the state. The vice president resident in the opposite part of the state from the executive vice president shall be senior to the other vice president north or south in the line of succession. The vice presidents north and south, in their respective parts of the state, shall be assigned oversight responsibility for the operation and management of the chapters to include membership retention programs.

(c) The vice president for membership shall function statewide and shall provide guidance and assistance to the chapters in membership recruiting. The incumbent of this office is not in the line of progression.

Section 4—SECRETARY.

- (a) The secretary shall conduct the general correspondence of the society and such other matters as may be directed by the board or president. He shall have charge of the seal, articles of incorporation, bylaws and records of the society and, together with the presiding officers, shall certify all acts of the society. He shall keep fair and accurate records of all memberships, proceedings and orders of the society, and shall give notice to the several officers of all votes, orders, resolves and proceedings of the society affecting them or appertaining to their respective duties. He shall notify all members of their election, and shall, under direction of the president, give due notice of the time, place and agenda of all meetings of the society or board and shall attend the same. He shall send or mail a copy of the minutes of the board to each of its members when directed to do so by the board.
- (b) The secretary, on receipt of the approved applications and certificate, shall himself sign the certificate of membership, supplemental and youth certificates, and forward it to the president for his signature and include the proper information to forward it to the new member's chapter secretary with postage affixed. The state secretary shall include the transmittal form and complete it within 20 days from date posted from the national society.
- (c) The secretary shall maintain a photocopy of each approved application, which may be a digitally imaged copy, of the recorded copy received from the national society.

Section 5—TREASURER—The treasurer shall collect and keep the general operating funds of the society. They shall be deposited in a banking institution approved by the board and shall be placed to the credit of the CALIFORNIA

SOCIETY OF THE SONS OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION. The treasurer shall expend funds of the society only as directed by the board through adoption of a budget or by specific direction for a particular item. Contracts for unbudgeted expenditures in excess of \$1,000 shall be pre-approved by the Executive Committee. Funds shall be authorized by a check request signed by any two (2) officers so authorized. He shall keep a true account of his receipts and disbursements and at each annual meeting render the same to the society. He shall also make such other reports as may be requested by the board.

Section 6—REGISTRAR—The registrar shall examine all applications for membership in the society for substantive completeness. The registrar shall report those found by him to be substantively complete to the board or agent it may designate. If the application is found by the registrar to be substantively incomplete, he shall bring the deficiency to the attention of the relevant chapter registrar with a concise explanation as to wherein the application is incomplete.

All communication with an applicant for membership shall be made by the appropriate chapter. The registrar will examine and process supplemental applications in the same manner as regular applications. The registrar shall receive and forward to NSSAR, all applications for membership found to be a substantively complete, together with admission fees as required, and shall maintain the file of duplicate applications. In the event of disagreement on substantive completeness, the matter shall be referred to the state genealogist who will make a final CASSAR determination of the matter.

Section 7—HISTORIAN—The historian shall obtain and preserve material relating to the history of this society, its chapters and its membership, including but not limited to medals and awards presented, news clippings, records of historical and commemorative meetings, minutes of meetings, names of officers, biographical and genealogical materials and obituaries. He shall from time to time forward appropriate materials to the editor of the California Compatriot, the NSSAR magazine or the NSSAR historian general. He shall supervise the preparation and printing of any society historical publications, other than those of membership rolls, which may be authorized by the board.

Section 8—GENEALOGIST—The genealogist shall assist the registrar and the board and any member of the society who may appeal to him for help in preparing application papers for membership. If the research is extensive, the genealogist shall be allowed to negotiate appropriate fees, without cost to the society. He shall examine all appeals from decisions or lack of action by the registrar. He shall report to the board on all matters that come before him.

Section 9—CHANCELLOR—The chancellor shall be an attorney-at-law and it shall be his duty to give opinions on all legal matters affecting the society when such questions are referred to him by the proper officers or by the board. He shall act as parliamentarian at meetings of the society and the board. Should he not so serve the president may appoint a substitute to act as parliamentarian.

Section 10—CHAPLAIN—The chaplain shall open and close meetings of the society and of the board with religious services usual and proper on such occasions, when so directed by the president or by the chairman of the meeting.

Section 11—SURGEON—The surgeon shall be a person licensed by the state to be a physician. He shall inform and advise the board on matters relating to public health which may be of concern to this society and to render first aid in cases of emergency at such meetings as he may attend.

Section 12—TRUSTEES OF THE INVESTED FUNDS—They shall select one of their members as chairman, and he shall have charge of all records and have the power to call a meeting of the trustees whenever he deems it necessary.

- (a) They shall manage and invest moneys, securities and property which may accrue to the permanent fund, the education fund, the congress fund, the unallocated fund, and/or the life membership fund in the names of the "Permanent Fund of the California Society, Sons of the American Revolution," the "Education Fund of the California Society, Sons of the American Revolution," the "Congress Fund of the California Society, Sons of the American Revolution," the "Unallocated Fund of the California Society, Sons of the American Revolution," and the "Life Membership Fund of the California Society, Sons of the American Revolution," respectively, in accordance with the Uniform Prudent Management of Institutional Funds Act. The funds shall be invested in a financial institution or investment account approved by the board in accounts named "Permanent Fund of the California Society, Sons of the American Revolution," "Education Fund of the California Society, Sons of the American Revolution," "Congress Fund of the California Society, Sons of the American Revolution," "Unallocated Fund of the California Society, Sons of the American Revolution," and "Life Membership Fund of the California Society, Sons of the American Revolution," respectively, in which all funds received by the trustees shall be deposited, including dividends, interest, net rents and the proceeds of property sold. Any such funds deposited therein may be withdrawn or transferred only on the signature of at least two trustees, which signature shall not be unreasonably withheld.
- (b) Withdrawal of income from investments or accounts may be made only as provided in bylaw No. 9. Only interest, dividends, unrealized gains, and net rents may be included in calculating such income. Where an investment, such as a money market account, has checking privileges, the trustees may use it for the banking institution account.
- (c) Status reports shall be presented to the board at the fall meeting and at the meeting closest preceding the annual meeting of membership and to the treasurer at least ten days before the annual meeting. Such report for

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the spring meetings shall include the amount available at the end of the fiscal year just concluded, and for the fall meeting, an estimate of the amount to be available at the end of the fiscal year, for use as provided in bylaw No. 9, together with a recommendation for a specific use that meets the patriotic, historical and educational purposes of the society.

- (d) The chairman of the invested fund shall provide to the Treasurer a copy of each statement as it is received from any institution in which Invested Fund assets are invested. If on-line access is available, the Chairman shall ensure the Treasurer is authorized to access the account information on-line.
- (e) Trustees shall select a Chairman not later than the close of the Spring Annual Meeting.

Section 13—VACANCIES IN OFFICE—A vacancy in any elected office (other than that of president) may be filled by the president on an interim basis until such time when it shall be filled by the vote of a majority of the board. Any vacancy not filled by the board shall be filled by the members at the annual meeting or special meeting of the membership.

Section 14—INCAPACITY

- (a) President an incapacity of the President that does not constitute a vacancy of office shall be determined by the Executive Committee by majority vote upon motion by any member of the Executive Committee, and a minimum of 15 (fifteen) days' notice to the President. The motion and vote may be conducted electronically. In addition, the President may declare a condition of incapacity and the duration thereof by written communication to the Secretary. During such incapacity of the President, the Executive Vice-President shall assume the duties of the President. If the Executive Vice-President is unavailable or incapacitated, such person as designated by the Executive Committee shall assume the Presidential duties.
- (b) Other Officers The Executive Committee, upon motion made by any member of that committee and majority vote, may declare any other officer to be incapacitated if that officer is unable, because of mental or physical disability, to fulfill the duties of his office. The officer shall have at least fifteen (15) days' notice of the motion. Upon passage of the motion, the President shall appoint another member to fill the incapacitated officer's unexpired term, which appointment shall be ratified by the Executive Committee. Upon such appointment, the incapacitated officer or representative or family member acting on his behalf, shall immediately transfer all books, records, materials and CASSAR assets in his possession to the newly-appointed officer.

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Bylaw No. 5 COMMITTEES

Section 1—NOMINATING COMMITTEE— The members of this committee shall be the (7) most recent former presidents who are able, active at the state level, having been present at the immediately preceding annual meeting or fall board meeting, and willing to serve. If there are not enough past presidents who are able and willing to serve, then the president may fill such vacancy on the committee by appointment of other members currently active at the state level, providing that the appointment seeks to equalize the representation between the north and south of the state, and no appointee shall come from a chapter already represented on the committee. The chairman of the committee shall be the most recent past president on the committee after the immediate past president.

(a) At least forty-five (45) days prior to each annual meeting, the chairman of the Nominating Committee shall provide the secretary with a list of proposed nominations for each elected office together with nominees for national trustee and alternate national trustee. All candidates for elective state office must be endorsed in writing by their chapter in a letter that includes: (i) a statement from the candidate that the candidate consents to serve; (ii) a statement from the chapter president or his designee endorsing the candidacy; and (iii) a brief biographical statement. Incumbents of elective state offices who are seeking reelection to the office they presently hold are excused from this requirement.

- (b) At least thirty (30) days prior to each annual meeting, the secretary shall provide a copy of the list of proposed nominees to each member of the board.
- (c) A member of the committee may be a candidate for an elective state office. However, that member may not participate in any discussions for that elective office, may not be present when that office is discussed and must recuse himself from any vote or decision concerning the compatriot whom shall be nominated for that state office.

Section 2—STANDING COMMITTEES—The following are required committees for which the president shall appoint a chairman when one is not otherwise indicated, and may appoint directly or with the chairman's recommendation, other members to the committee:

(a) BUDGET AND PLANNING COMMITTEE. It shall be comprised of the executive vice-president (who shall be chairman); the vice president north; the vice president south; the treasurer; and a chapter president from the north, and a chapter president from the south, appointed by the state president. The state president shall appoint a state officer to replace the executive vice president, vice president north, and vice president south, if any of them are unable to serve on the committee.

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The chairman of the invested funds trustees shall be a non-voting member of the committee. They shall estimate income and expenditures, and recommend such fiscal actions as they consider in the best interests of the society. One of their main duties is to prepare a recommended annual budget for the following year.

- (b) AUDIT COMMITTEE. It shall be comprised of the executive vice- president (who shall be chairman); the vice president north; the vice president south; and a chapter president from the north, and a chapter president from the south, appointed by the state president. The state president shall appoint a state officer to replace the executive vice president, vice president north, and vice president south, if any of them are unable to serve on the committee. The treasurer and the chairman of the invested funds trustees shall be non-voting members of the committee. At least one member of the Audit Committee shall be 'financially literate' meaning substantial prior experience and knowledge of financial matters. It shall audit the books and records of the treasurer and of the trustees of the permanent fund, and shall report to the president at the annual meeting.
- (c) MEETINGS AND CREDENTIALS COMMITTEE. With the executive vice president as chairman, the committee shall supervise arrangements for meetings and determine voting eligibility. The presidents of the respective host chapters for the various meetings of the board and of the society, together with such chapter members as each of these chapter presidents shall deem necessary, shall be the other members of this committee. The committee shall maintain the list of eligible voters, contact all chapters to confirm their delegates, chapter presidents (or official designee), and state officers. The committee shall provide the list of eligible voters to the secretary for the roll call and determination of a quorum. They should object when one person

answers present as an officer, and as a member of a chapter. They shall produce the voting cards for the meetings where voting is restricted so we do not count ineligible votes.

- (d) MEMBERSHIP COMMITTEE. The vice president for membership shall be chairman. The chairmen of the chapter membership committees shall serve as members of this committee. It shall solicit and encourage candidates for membership to file applications and join the society.
- (e) AMERICANISM AND PATRIOTIC EDUCATION COMMITTEE. It shall encourage the patriotic activities of this society and assist and advise the chapters in these matters. It shall recommend to the board specific utilization of income from the president's education fund and the CASSAR education fund.

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- (f) CHAPTER ACTIVITIES AND AWARDS COMMITTEE. It shall encourage chapters and members to engage in activities to stimulate interest in the patriotic, historical and educational objects of the society and to arrange for appropriate rewards to the most active chapters and members.
- (g) SCOUT PROGRAM COMMITTEE. It shall conduct society participation in the annual Eagle Scout contest sponsored by NSSAR, interfacing with NSSAR, and shall encourage chapter participation in appropriate scout activities.
- (h) PUBLICATIONS COMMITTEE. It shall be responsible for all California society publications except the CALI FORNIA COMPATRIOT and the president's newsletter, the PATRIOT VOLUNTEER. They will assist and encourage the chapters where possible and will recommend the winner of the California Society Publication Award to the president.
- (i) BYLAWS AND RESOLUTIONS COMMITTEE. It shall prepare the language for any proposed amendments to the Articles of Incorporation, and the bylaws and proposed resolutions of this society. It shall cause the required notice to be given to the chapters of proposed amendments, and shall bring for dispositive action all properly noticed proposed amendments before the annual meeting of the membership and all prepared resolutions before the meetings of the society. The chancellor shall be a member of this committee.
- (j) ETHICS COMMITTEE. The Ethics Committee shall consist of the CASSAR Chaplain, CASSAR Chancellor, and a Past President, as chosen by the current President. The CASSAR Chaplain shall be the Committee Chairman. If the CASSAR Chaplain abstains from voting on ethics matters brought before the committee, he shall appoint a Compatriot in good standing to the Ethics Committee at his discretion as a replacement voting member, ensuring an odd number of voting committee members.

Section 3—Special Committees—Special committees, as deemed appropriate by the president, may be appointed by him for his term of office. The president shall be an ex-officio member of all standing and special committees.

Section 4—Program Managers—To facilitate management control and staff supervision over the operation of the standing and special committees of the society the president shall appoint for his term of office program managers to guide and advise the president and committee chairmen on functional performance within the society.

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Bylaw No. 5(a) THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

Section 1— There shall be a CASSAR executive committee with a total membership of nine. The executive committee shall be composed of the president, the immediate past president, the four vice presidents (executive, north, south and membership), the secretary, the treasurer, and the chancellor.

Section 2—The executive committee shall meet at the call of the president at such time as he determines that business of the society is of such urgency that it may not be postponed until an appropriate regular or specially noticed meeting.

Section 3—All decisions of the executive committee which are within the purview of the membership's or the board's powers of approval are on an interim basis and must be ratified or rejected at the next regular meeting of the appropriate forum. The executive committee may take no action in contravention of the Articles of Incorporation.

Section 4—The secretary will record the business of all meetings of the executive committee and disseminate it to members of the committee. The chancellor shall act to assure ratification or rejection of decisions of the committee so required at the next regularly scheduled meeting of the appropriate forum.

Section 5—The Executive Committee is the "governing body" for purposes of review and approval of required Internal Revenue Service forms and reports and for purposes of compliance with Federal and State law.

Bylaw No. 6 MAGAZINE

The president shall appoint a member to be the editor of the CALIFORNIA COMPATRIOT, the publication of the society.

Bylaw No. 7 FEES AND DUES.

Section 1—The admission fee for membership shall be that currently declared by NSSAR Bylaw No. 22, Section 1. The fee for each supplemental claim to establish additional ancestral lines of eligibility shall be that currently declared by NSSAR Bylaw No. 22, Section 3, plus that fee currently declared by the board. The fee for Memorial Memberships shall be that currently declared by the NSSAR, plus a fee declared by the board.

Section 2—The annual dues for all members shall include the per-capita due to NSSAR, plus that due to this society, plus that due to the chapter. NSSAR dues currently declared are NSSAR Bylaw No. 22, Section 3. The board shall recommend to membership at the annual meeting the per-capita amount for this society. Each chapter shall determine the per-capita amount due to the chapter and shall collect the total dues from its members.

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Section 3—The business year and fiscal year for this society is from January 1 through December 31 of the same year. The per-capita annual dues for those amounts payable to NSSAR and to this society shall be paid by each chapter to the state secretary by January 5 of each year. A member is delinquent in payment of annual dues after December 15th and shall automatically be suspended and shall be dropped from membership after December 31. Each chapter shall prepare an annual reconciliation report and submit to the society secretary on or before January 5th of the following year. New members approved and registered by NSSAR on or after the date approved and registered by NSSAR do not pay NSSAR dues for the balance of the calendar year per NSSAR Bylaw No. 22 and the dues for this society are similarly waived.

Section 4— A member whose membership has been terminated, whether for nonpayment of dues or otherwise, may be reinstated by payment of the current chapter, state and national dues to the treasurer, provided that his request for reinstatement first be approved by the appropriate chapter and the Executive Committee. Upon application for reinstatement, the Secretary shall forward the request via email to the Executive Committee, which shall be deemed to have approved the request unless any member of the Executive Committee objects within five days of notice. Upon timely objection, the President shall schedule a meeting of the Executive Committee, which may be held electronically, permitting the concerns to be discussed and a vote taken. If the request is denied, the applicant may appeal to the Board of Managers. Upon approval, the state secretary will advise the NSSAR thereby entering him as a member in good standing.

Section 5—Where there is evidence that hardship or misfortune may cause the lapse of payment of dues, a chapter or the board may grant to any member an exemption for that year's dues. The NSSAR no longer excuses such dues. The chapter or the board making such exemption must make provision to pay NSSAR dues for such members.

Section 6— Any Regular Member in good standing after April 12, 2014, who is also a NSSAR Life Member, and who shall make payment in accordance with a fee schedule established by the Executive Board with input from the Trustees of the Investment Funds shall become a CASSAR Life Member and shall thereafter be exempt from payment of all required annual dues to the California Society and his chapter within the California Society. The one-time payment shall be added to the CASSAR LIFE MEMBERSHIP FUND and the income therefrom shall be utilized to pay the annual dues components to this society and to the chapter to which he subsequently belongs. Members of CASSAR who have previously paid for a CASSAR Life Membership prior to April 12, 2014, will continue to have their dues payments cover NSSAR, CASSAR, and their chapter dues payments. Non-CASSAR members who obtain a CASSAR Life Membership plan

shall thereafter be exempt from payment of all required annual dues to the California Society and his chapter within the California Society.

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Section 7—Upon transfer of membership from one chapter to another, the dues for the year in which the transfer is made shall be paid to and belong to the remitting chapter and must be paid before the transfer is approved, said transfer to be accomplished by letter from the transferring member to the state secretary and the secretaries of the two chapters involved. Transfers from one state society to another shall be in accordance with NSSAR Bylaw No. 2, section 9.

Section 8—A member in good standing may become a dual member of another chapter (secondary) upon approval by a majority of its elected officers and the payment of dues of that chapter. This form of membership provides for the opportunity to attend meetings, activities and events of the secondary chapter. However, such membership does not provide for the privilege of voting or holding office in the secondary chapter.

Section 9—An emeritus member is defined as a member of the CASSAR who has paid dues to the CASSAR for fifty years (does not have to be continuous). Upon reaching emeritus member status, the member shall be exempt from paying all additional CASSAR and chapter dues.

Bylaw No. 8 MEETINGS AND DELEGATES Section 1—MEETINGS OF THE SOCIETY

- (a) A meeting of the membership shall comprise all members of this society in attendance who are in good standing but the right to vote shall be limited to one vote for each such member who is either an elected chapter delegate or an elected society officer.
- (b) Each chapter shall be entitled to two elected delegates plus one additional elected delegate for each fifty (50) members of the chapter as determined by the January 1 membership count of the current year listed on the Annual Reconciliation Report filed and approved by the state secretary preceding the date of the meeting.
- (c) A quorum at any meeting of the membership or of the Board shall be a majority of total of (a) the elected state officers plus (b) one delegate from each chapter. A quorum for purposes of a vote on a proposed bylaw amendment shall be the majority of chapters. Except as otherwise specified in these bylaws, the affirmative vote of a majority of the voting power present shall be necessary to approve any action of the meeting.
- (d) The annual meeting of the membership shall be held the third Saturday in April, unless the executive committee fixes another date and so notifies all members of record as soon as practicable but not less than ninety (90) days prior to the date of such annual meeting. The meeting shall be held at a location selected in advance by the executive committee. Such location to be alternated on an annual basis between the

northern and southern areas of the state.

- (e) The following order of business is suggested for the annual meeting of the membership:
- 1. Call to order by the president
- 2. Invocation
- 3. Pledge of allegiance and opening ritual
- 4. Credentials Committee report & roll call of delegates 5. Presentation of minutes of previous annual meeting 6. Address of president
- 7. Reports of officers
- 8. Chapter reports
- 9. Report of auditing committees
- 10. Reports of standing committees
- 11. Reports of special committees
- 12. Old and unfinished business
- 13. New business
- 14. Election of officers
- 15. Appointment of committee chairmen
- 16. Closing ritual and adjournment
- (f) Special meetings of the membership may be called by the president or by the board from time-to-time. The general nature of the business to be transacted shall be stated in the notice of meeting and no other business shall be transacted at the meeting.
- (g) Not less than twenty (20) days prior to the date of any annual or special meeting of the membership, the secretary shall transmit notice of the time, place and agenda thereof to each chapter secretary and to each member who, on the record date for notice of meeting is entitled to vote thereat. (Corp. Code §5511.) Notice shall be transmitted either electronically and by posting on the CASSAR website.
- (h) Only members who are registered to attend the meetings of the members or Board of Managers shall be permitted to vote at those meetings.
- (i) The Executive Committee, Board of Managers, Membership, and all Committees of the State Society may participate in special meetings, or conduct a meeting, including the Annual Meeting of the Membership, through use of any means of communication by which all individuals participating may simultaneously hear each other during the meeting. This provision shall allow for the use of the Internet, a conference telephone, video conference or other communications method so long as all individuals participating in the meeting can communicate with each other at the same time. A participant in a meeting by this means is deemed to be present at the meeting. Voting on all matters shall be

permitted, with votes cast by individualized voice vote of the participants or by an electronic vote tabulation means by which the Chairman of the meeting shall be able to confirm the submission of a vote by an individual member. Proxy voting shall not be permitted. This provision shall be interpreted to permit any electronic means that combines voice and/or video communication with capability of document sharing either in advance of or during the meeting.

(j) In an emergency, the time and location of an Annual Meeting, Fall BOM meeting or any Special Meeting may be changed by the affirmative vote of two-thirds of the Executive Committee voting upon the question by electronic means; provided that votes by electronic means shall be returned to the President and Secretary within five days after the solicitation of said votes.

Section 2—MEETINGS OF THE BOARD

- (a) Two (2) regular meetings of the board shall be held annually, one as soon as is practicable following adjournment of the annual meeting of the membership for the purposes of organization and for the transaction of other business properly presented. A second shall be held the first Saturday in November, alternately in the northern and southern areas of the state, unless otherwise scheduled by the board as soon as practicable, but not less than ninety (90) days prior to the date of such second meeting.
- (b) Special meetings of the board may be called from time-to-time by the president upon written request of five (5) members of the board; provided, however, that should the president fail or neglect to do so, such five (5) members may call such special meeting, and, in either case, the secretary shall give notice thereof. No business shall be conducted in any special meeting except that specified in the notice.
- (c) A majority of the number of board members authorized by article IV of the Articles of Incorporation constitutes a quorum of the board for the transaction of business. Every act or decision done or made by a majority of the board members present at a meeting duly held at which a quorum is present is the act of the board. (Corp. Code § 5211) Each board member shall have only one vote notwithstanding he may hold two positions each of which qualifies him for board membership.

Section 3—CONDUCT OF MEETINGS

All meetings of this society, of the board and of committees shall be - 15 -

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conducted in accordance with these bylaws, or where they are silent, by the provisions of the most recent edition of Robert's Rules of Order, Newly Revised.

Section 4—ELECTIONS

(a) Elections of officers shall be by ballot provided that by unanimous consent of the electing body, election by ballot may be waived as to any office, if, after nominations for that office are

declared closed, only one has been nominated for that office. There shall be no cumulative or proxy voting.

- (b) VOTING RIGHTS—The voting rights of delegates to state meetings as expressed in the articles and bylaws are restated as follows:
- (i) General Provisions—At all meetings of the state society: (a) there shall be no voting by proxy; (b) a chapter president may designate another member in good standing from his chapter to vote as an acting chapter president at any meeting of the society if the chapter president is absent from the meeting or is an elected society officer; however, any such designation must be made in writing presented to the secretary prior to the chapter roll call and must remain in effect for the duration of that meeting; (c) each delegate is entitled to only one vote regardless of the number of state offices he may hold or the number of chapters he may hold membership in; (d) a chapter cannot be represented by a member holding only a dual membership in that chapter; and (e) the presiding officer of the meeting may only cast his vote to break a tie.
- (ii) Regular or Special Meetings of the Board of Managers. At all meetings of the board, voting is restricted to the state president, the immediate former state president, the elected officers of the state society, and the chapter presidents (or their designees).
- (iii) Annual or Special Meetings of Members. At all meetings of the membership of the society, voting is restricted to the state president, the immediate former state president, each elected state officer, and the elected delegates from each chapter as calculated per Bylaw 8, Section 1(b).
- (iv) Amendments of Bylaws. At annual or board of managers meetings properly noticed, proposed amendments to the bylaws may be voted upon with such voting restricted to one vote for each chapter president (or his designee). Passage of the proposed amendment requires at least a two-thirds vote of the chapters

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present and voting at the meeting.

- (v) Amendments of Articles of Incorporation. At annual or board of managers meetings properly noticed, proposed amendments to the Articles of Incorporation may be voted upon with such voting restricted to one vote for each chapter president (or his designee). Passage of the proposed amendment requires at least a two-thirds vote of the chapters present and voting at the meeting.
- (c) Voting by Ballot—Voting by ballot shall be conducted in accordance with the most recent edition of Robert's Rules of Order, Newly Revised. All ballots will be distributed only to eligible voters by three tellers appointed for that purpose by the presiding officer.
- (i) After all qualified voters have cast their ballot, the tellers will retire to count the ballots. The chief teller will certify the results in a written report including the total number of ballots cast,

the number of votes received by each candidate, and the number of ballots disqualified and the reasons therefore.

(ii) Upon returning to the room, the chief teller will be recognized by the presiding officer. After reading his report, the chief teller will give his report and the ballots to the presiding officer. The presiding officer will again read the report of the chief teller and then announce the winner of the election. In the event of a tie the process is repeated. In the event a motion for a recount is passed by the majority of the delegates, the presiding officer may turn the ballots over to another group of tellers to recount the ballots and again report the results to the presiding officer.

Section 5—NATIONAL CONGRESS

The California delegate at large and the membership delegates and alternates to the annual congress, or delegates to any special congress, of NSSAR shall be appointed by the president to the full extent allowed in NSSAR Bylaw No. 20.

Bylaw No. 9 THE INVESTED FUNDS

Section 1 This society shall maintain a permanent fund, to insure the stability and perpetuity of this society. Administration and management of the permanent fund shall be the responsibility of the trustees of the invested funds, as provided in bylaw No. 4, section 12.

(a) The permanent fund shall comprise all moneys or property, real or personal, which may accrue to this society by donation, gift, devise,

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bequest or otherwise unless use thereof is otherwise designated as a condition to receipt or is otherwise directed by a majority vote of the board with at least three-quarters of the members of the board present and voting.

(b) The annual earnings (defined as income, dividends, realized and unrealized gains) from the permanent fund shall be accumulated and one-half shall be transferred to the Unallocated Fund and one-half shall be reinvested in the permanent fund at the beginning of each fiscal year.

Section 2 This society shall maintain an education fund in furtherance of its educational purposes and youth programs. Administration and management of the education fund shall be the responsibility of the trustees of the invested funds, as provided in bylaw No. 4, section 12.

- (a) The education fund shall comprise all moneys or property, real or personal, which may accrue to this society by donation, gift, devise, bequest or otherwise that is designated for the education fund or solely for educational purposes.
- (b) The principal and income from this fund shall be distributed by the board exclusively for educational purposes.

Section 3 This society shall maintain a congress fund to meet the obligations of a host society whenever the Society hosts the Annual Congress of the Sons of the American Revolution. Administration and management of the congress fund shall be the responsibility of the trustees of the invested funds, as provided in bylaw No. 4, section 12.

- (a) The congress fund shall comprise all moneys or property, real or personal, which may accrue to this society by donation, gift, devise, bequest or otherwise that is designated for the congress fund or allocated to the fund in the annual society budget.
- (b) The principal and income from this fund shall be distributed by the congress planning committee exclusively for host society expenses in connection with the society hosting the Annual Congress of the Sons of the American Revolution.

Section 4 This society shall maintain an unallocated fund to invest the funds of the Society that are not allocated to one of the other invested fund accounts and are not needed for the current expenses of the society. Administration and management of the unallocated fund shall be the responsibility of the trustees of the invested funds, as provided in bylaw No. 4, section 12.

(a) The unallocated fund shall comprise all the general funds of the - 18 -

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society not allocated to a restricted fund nor needed for the current expenses of the society.

(b) The principal and income from this fund shall be distributed to the treasurer upon his request and deposited into the general funds of the society to meet the current expenses of the society.

Section 5 This society shall maintain a life membership fund to maintain the life memberships purchased by regular members of this society. Administration and management of the life membership fund shall be the responsibility of the trustees of the invested funds, as provided in bylaw No. 4, section 12.

- (a) There are three classes of CASSAR Life membership.
- (1) For CASSAR members purchasing a CASSAR Life Membership, they must have already obtained a NSSAR Life Membership. The CASSAR plan will only pay their CASSAR and California chapter dues (not to exceed (\$10.00) ten dollars), as provided in bylaw No, 7, section 6.
- (2) For CASSAR members who obtained a CASSAR Life Membership prior to April 12, 2014, the plan will pay their NSSAR, CASSAR and chapter dues (not to exceed (\$10.00) ten dollars), as provided in bylaw No, 7, section 6.
- (3) For non-CASSAR members who obtain a CASSAR Life Membership, the plan will only pay their CASSAR and California chapter dues (not to exceed (\$10.00) ten dollars), as provided in bylaw No, 7, section 6.

- (b) The life membership fund shall comprise all moneys that have been paid or will be paid to purchase life memberships.
- (c) The principal and income from this fund shall be distributed to the treasurer annually and deposited into the general funds of the society to cover the annual dues of the life members.

Bylaw No. 10 THE LADIES AUXILIARY

To further the work of this society, women of good repute in the community who are related to SAR members in good standing shall be encouraged and assisted by the society in the establishment and operation of an independent organization to be named the Ladies' Auxiliary of the California Society of the Sons of the American Revolution.

RESTATED ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION OF THE CALIFORNIA SOCIETY OF THE SONS OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION

The entire text of the articles of incorporation of THE CALIFORNIA SOCIETY OF THE SONS OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION, a California Nonprofit Public Benefit Corporation, as amended, are restated in accordance with the California Corporations Code to read as follows:

INTRODUCTION

This corporation is a nonprofit public benefit corporation and is not organized for the private gain of any person. It is organized under the Nonprofit Public Benefit Law for public purposes.

ARTICLE I

The name of this corporation shall be "The California Society of the Sons of the American Revolution."

ARTICLE II

The purposes for which this corporation is formed and the powers which it shall have in addition to those enumerated under the provisions of the laws of the State of California, applicable thereto are as follows:

1. The purposes and objects of this Society are declared to be patriotic, historical and educational, and shall include those intended or designed to perpetuate the memory of the men who, by their services or sacrifices during the war of the American Revolution, achieved the independence of the American people; to unite and promote fellowship among their descendants; to inspire them and the community at large with a more profound reverence for the principles of the government founded by our forefathers; to encourage historical research in relation to the American Revolution; to acquire and preserve the records of the individual services of the patriots of the war, as well as documents, relics and landmarks; to mark the scenes of the American Revolution by appropriate memorials; to celebrate the anniversaries of the prominent events of the war and of the American Revolutionary period; to foster true patriotism; to maintain and extend the institutions of American freedom; and to carry out the purposes expressed in the preamble of the Constitution of our country and the injunctions of Washington in his farewell address to the American people.

- 2. To own, acquire, hold and dispose of real and personal property to be used in the furtherance of the work of this corporation.
- 3. To contract, convey and take gifts, bequests and devises of real and personal property.

4. To have such powers to do and perform any and all acts necessary or advisable in conformity with the objects and purposes of this corporation, to the same extent and capacity as possessed by an actual person, whether enumerated in the laws of the State of California or in these articles, or which may be properly implied therefrom.

ARTICLE III

The principal place of business of this corporation shall be in the State of California. The street address shall be as filed annually with the Secretary of State according to the provisions of Corporation Code 6210, operative January 1, 1980. Designation of the agent for the purpose of service of process and designation of the corporate officer responsible for filing the annual form prescribed by the Secretary of State shall be as provided in the Bylaws.

ARTICLE IV

The governing board of this corporation shall be designated as the "Board of Managers" elected in accordance with the bylaws and shall consist of the elected officers of the society and an elected representative from each chapter of the society, as provided in the bylaws.

ARTICLE V

There shall be no capital stock issued by this corporation. The members of this corporation shall consist of such persons as may be elected as such under provisions of the bylaws of this corporation, and shall be limited to male persons who are citizens of good repute in the community, who are the lineal descendants of an ancestor who, at the time of the last known service, demonstrated loyalty to and rendered active service in the cause of the American independence, either as an officer, soldier, seaman, marine, militiaman, or minute man in the armed forces of the Continental Congress, or of any of the several Colonies or States or as signer of the Declaration of Independence, or as a member of the Committee of Safety or Correspondence, or as a member of any Continental Provincial, or Colonial Congress or Legislature, as a foreign national of, but not limited to, France, Germany, Poland, Spain, Sweden, or Switzerland who rendered service in the cause of American Independence, or as a recognized patriot who performed actual service by overt acts or resistance to the authority of Great Britain, provided, however, that no person advocating the overthrow of the Government of the United States by use of force or violence shall be eligible for membership in the Society.

Membership in this corporation shall not be transferable.

ARTICLE VI

Actions of the membership of this corporation shall be taken at any regular or special meeting of the membership of this incorporation by voting delegates representing the membership and

chosen through and by local chapters or other subdivisions of this corporation. Every member of this corporation shall be entitled to one (1) vote in selecting such voting delegate or delegates from his chapter or other subdivision of this corporation. The bylaws shall provide for such voting delegates according to the requirements of Corporations Code Sections 5132 and 5133, operative January 1, 1980. No voting by proxy by or for any member of this corporation shall be permitted in any matter pertain to elections or other business of this corporation or of any local chapters or other subdivisions of the California Society of the Sons of the American Revolution.

ARTICLE VII

The property rights interests of the members shall at all times equal and are not assignable, either by voluntary act or by operation of law.

ARTICLE VIII

This corporation shall have perpetual existence.

ARTICLE IX

In accordance with the provisions of the California Corporations Code 9913, operative January 1, 1980, this corporation elects to be governed by all of the provisions of the California Nonprofit Public Benefit Corporation Law not otherwise applicable to this corporation under sections 9910-9927 of the Corporations Code.

ARTICLE X

Any member of this Society of whatever class or category who, by conduct disloyal to the ideals or prejudicial to the interests of the Sons of the American Revolution, shall have rendered himself unworthy of the membership therein, may be disciplined up to and including suspension, termination or expulsion, by a three-fifths vote of the Board of Managers provided that such recommendation is made after Hearing by a three-fifths vote of a Committee of Inquiry consisting of the most senior Past President able and willing to serve, the President, the most senior Vice President able and willing to serve, or, if two are of equal seniority in office, one of them chosen by lot, and two Presidents of Chapters other than those of the aforementioned three members of this Committee. The President shall appoint the committee members within these constraints.

A motion passed by the Board of Managers or by a Special or Annual Meeting of the Membership or an executive decision by a majority of the elected officers of this Society

shall be authority to call a Committee of Inquiry. The accused shall be given fifteen days prior notice of the Hearing with the reasons therefore. He shall have an opportunity to be heard, orally

on in writing, by the Committee prior to their decision and not less than five days prior to any Board of Managers vote on the Committee's recommendation. Any member thus terminated or expelled shall from the date of such action by the Board of Managers cease to be a member of this Society or of any of its Chapters or to hold any rights or privileges connected with such membership including any interest in activities, properties or funds of the Society or any of its Chapters except that any member terminated or expelled according to the provisions above shall within sixty days of the date of such actions have the right to file with the Secretary of the Society an appeal for reversal of the decision by the next Annual or Special Meeting of the Membership and the decision of such meeting shall be final.

ARTICLE XI

An appointed Bylaws Committee shall prepare the language for any proposed amendment to the Bylaws. The chapters of this society shall be given notice of such proposed amendment at least 30 days prior to a meeting of the membership at which the amendment shall be put to vote. An affirmative vote of two-thirds of the chapters of this society present and eligible to vote, represented by the chapter president or his designated alternate, shall be required for approval.

The foregoing is a true and accurate restatement of the Articles of Incorporation endorsed for filing by the California Secretary of State on November 30, 1984, with assigned California Corporations Number C-0137972, and of the amendments thereto as follows: Amendment One dated July 19, 1986; Amendment Two dated April 2, 1988; and Amendment Three dated April 21, 2018. These articles and amendments thereto were duly approved by the board of managers and received the required vote of the chapters represented by the presidents (or their designees).

CALIFORNIA SOCIETY SONS OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION 145th FALL BOARD OF MANAGERS MEETING Zoom Meeting November 14, 2020

The meeting was called to order by President Littlefield at 9:00AM (Pacific Time). The invocation was given by Chaplain Carlson. There was a moment of silence to honor the memory of James F. Blauer, our late CASSAR Historian. The Pledge of Allegiance was led by President Littlefield. The SAR Pledge was led by VP North Anderson. Secretary Schuster did the Roll Call (See Exhibit A), and President Littlefield declared a quorum. Due to the passing of our CASSAR Historian, President Littlefield appointed Stephen Renouf to take the minutes of the meeting. In compliance with the bylaws, voting at the meeting was limited to CASSAR Officers and a chapter president/designee for each chapter.

There was a motion by Registrar Stiles (seconded by Chaplain Carlson) to adopt the minutes as presented, which was approved by unanimous consent.

President Littlefield introduced the National Officers – President General Jack Manning, Vice President General James Fosdyck (Western District), Treasurer General Bruce Pickette, Genealogist General Jim Faulkinbury, Registrar General Doug Collins, Librarian General Tony Vets, Surgeon General Dr. Darryl Addington, Chaplain General Rev. David Felts, VPG Ernie Sutton (Mid-Atlantic District), VPG Allen Greenly (South Atlantic District), VPG Bobby Joe Seales (Southern District), VPG Chris Moberg (North Central District), VPG James Lindley (Pacific District), SAR Foundation Board Members John Dodd and Rev. Lou Carlson, NSSAR Trustee for California Derek Brown, NSSAR Trustee for Nevada Charles Smith, and NSSAR Trustee for Spain Stephen Renouf. John Dodd made a pitch for the SAR Foundation to encourage people to accelerate their 2021 annual giving to 2020 to complete the last part of the design phase for the SAR Education Center and Museum. The past state presidents were introduced – Marston Watson (1970-71), Robert Ebert (2006-07), Stephen Renouf (2008-09), Rev. Lou Carlson (2009-10), John Dodd (2011-12), Jim Faulkinbury (2014-15), Kent Gregory (2015-16), Jim Fosdyck (2017-18), Derek Brown (2018-19), and Robert Taylor (2019-20).

President Littlefield noted that Wreaths Across America Public Ceremonies have been cancelled due to social distancing restrictions, but there will be limited private ceremonies with no public invitations, to honor each of various branches of the military and the POWs/MIAs.

AWARDS

President Littlefield announced the National Awards that were presented for the cancelled National Congress in Richmond, Virginia. The California Society received the **Officer**

Attendance Award for having the president and national trustee present for the previous two leadership meetings and congress, the Admiral Furlong Award for States/chapters presenting SAR Flag Certificates, and the Graham T. Smallwood, Jr. Award for a State Society of 500 or more members with the best newsletter over 10 pages. The California Society Children of the American Revolution won the Eleanor Smallwood Niebell Award for State Society with the best newsletter. The California Society received Certificates of Participation for the SAR Poster Contest (the CASSAR winner from Folsom, CA, won third prize in the National Contest), the SAR Brochure Contest, SAR Knight Essay Contest, SAR JROTC Contest, and the SAR Marian L. Brown Eagle Scout Award for sponsoring the National SAR Eagle Scout Contest winner.

CANDIDATES FORUM

The California Society held a Candidates Forum for those running for National Office in 2021: **Dr. Darryl Addington** SAR Foundation Board, **Doug Collins** SAR Foundation Board, **John Dodd** Treasurer General, Kent Gregory spoke for **PG Joe Dooley** SAR Foundation Board, **Dwight Elam** Chaplain General (submitted a video), **Bob Fish** Genealogist General, **Allen Greenly** Registrar General, **James Lindley** Historian General, **Bruce Pickette** Secretary General, **Lee Popham** SAR Foundation Board, **Dr. Ernest Sutton** Surgeon General, and **Tony Vets** Registrar General.

President Littlefield declared a recess by unanimous consent at 10:12AM.

President Littlefield called the meeting back to order at 10:19AM. Candidates who were not CASSAR members were asked to leave the meeting so the California Society could discuss the candidates running for National office. Chaplain Carlson made a motion (seconded by President Designee Marston Watson of the San Francisco Chapter) to endorse all candidates who were running unopposed for election, which was approved by unanimous consent. Then, Invested Funds Trustee Gregory made a motion (seconded by Chaplain Carlson), to endorse Tony Vets in the contested race for Registrar General, which was approved by unanimous vote. Secretary Fred Schuster was directed to e-mail NSSAR Nominating Committee Chairman Warren Alter the CASSAR endorsements for national office: President General Davis Wright, Secretary General Bruce Pickette, Treasurer General John Dodd, Esq., Chancellor General Michael Elston, Genealogist General Robert Fish, Registrar General Tony Vets, Historian General James Lindley, Librarian General Fred Olive III, Surgeon General Ernest Sutton, Chaplain General Dwight Elam, Foundation Board Lee Popham, Foundation Board Douglas Collins, Foundation Board Joseph Dooley, and Foundation Board Darryl Addington.

SPEAKER

President Littlefield introduced **Hallie Wallace**, one of CASSAR's two Valley Forge Contest winners in 2020, who is a 5th grade teacher at Oak Chan Elementary School in Folsom, California. Hallie Wallace spoke about attending the first-ever virtual Valley Forge Program, and thanked the California Society for sponsoring her for the Valley Forge Program. President

Littlefield promised to send her an **SAR Certificate of Appreciation** for her presentation to our membership.

OFFICER/COMMITTEE REPORTS

President Littlefield requested officer reports that were in not in "The Book." Chancellor General Dodd reported that he received a query regarding the California Society requesting the California DMV issue specialty SAR license plates. He looked into the procedure and found that it was not feasible; SAR license plate holders are a better alternative. Executive VP Stephens requested submissions for the California Compatriot for the December 31, 2020 deadline, and noted that the CASSAR Annual Meeting is being planned for April 15-18, 2021 at the historic Mission Inn in Riverside, California. Vice President South Klingler requested chapters to e-mail him the names of great speakers that they have had at their meetings, and he will put the speaker's contact information on the CASSAR website's new Speakers Bureau Program section — with Zoom Meetings, geographical location of speakers is no longer an issue. Surgeon Matt Bowdish noted that he has two talks that he can give to chapters — one on "Medical History of George Washington," and another on "DNA and Genealogy." On the ongoing coronavirus pandemic, he recommended that people make good choices.

Eagle Scout Chairman Bill Nay offered to send a Zoom Meeting link to those interested in his slide presentation on the Law, Genealogy, and American Heritage Merit Badges of the Boy Scouts, and noted chapter Eagle Scout winners need to be submitted to CASSAR by December 31, 2020. Valley Forge Chairman Bob Taylor requested chapters to recommend quality teachers for the 2021 contest.

CHAPTER REPORTS

President Littlefield requested officer reports that were in not in "The Book." Immediate Past President Bob Taylor noted that the General George Patton Chapter recently held its first inperson meeting since the coronavirus pandemic, and incorporated Zoom Meeting for those unable to attend in person. President Phil Mitchell of the Orange County Chapter thanked the state officers who attended the memorial for CASSAR Historian Jim Blauer at their chapter meeting. President Designee Marston Watson noted that the San Francisco Chapter has a young man running for chapter president in 2021 – Luke Dziurzynski – who is the CASSAR Compliance Committee Chairman. They have about 90 members, but are struggling to keep going due to only having a few active members. President Bill Van Valkenburg of the Redwood Empire Chapter noted that the chapter would be hosting its first Zoom Meeting (thanks to Bill Nay) on November 28, 2020, and they have ten new members to induct into the SAR. President Dick Ferman of the Silicon Valley Chapter, who is an Enrolled Agent, noted that the IRS is waiving the Required Minimum Distribution from retirement plans in 2020 due to the coronavirus pandemic.

President Littlefield declared a recess by unanimous consent at 11:03AM.

SPECIAL REPORTS

President Littlefield called the meeting back to order at 11:13AM. Executive VP Stephens delivered the Audit Committee Report. The committee consisted of Executive VP Stephens (chairman), VP North Anderson, VP South Klingler, Bill Nay from the North, Curtis Porter from the South, and President Littlefield. The audit period was April 1, 2020 through October 31, 2020, and was conducted electronically – the committee requested backup for some checks and deposits, and Treasurer Ferris provided them all, which were found to be in good order.

Trustees Renouf, Dodd and Gregory delivered the Invested Funds Trustees Report. The report was "in the Book," and showed for the 12-month period ending September 30, 2020, that the invested funds accounts had an increase of a little over \$8,000. For calendar year 2020 through October 31, 2020, after the roller coaster year with coronavirus and elections, there was a net unrealized gain of over \$4,000. The trustees will have a call with the broker at Morgan Stanley for a strategy call about when to implement the approved increase in risk tolerance for the various CASSAR funds after the uncertainly over US Senate control is determined in early January 2021.

Past CASSAR President Derek Brown announced the CASSAR Nominating Committee Report: President Brian Stephens (not standing for election, president-elect), Executive VP Craig Anderson, Vice President South Jim Klingler, Vice President North Bill Van Valkenburg, Vice President Membership Doug Bergtholdt (not standing for election, two-year term), Secretary Fred Schuster, Treasurer John Ferris, Registrar Owen Stiles, Chancellor John Dodd, Esq., Genealogist Terry Briggs, Historian Scott Knecht, Chaplain Rt. Rev. Lou Carlson, Surgeon Dr. Matthew Bowdish, Investment Funds Trustee John Dodd (for 3-year term), Investment Funds Trustee Dr. Kent Gregory (not standing for election, 3-year term), Investment Funds Trustee Stephen Renouf (not standing for election, 3-year term), and Immediate Past President Donald Littlefield (not standing for election). The California Society is nominating Robert Taylor for NSSAR Trustee for California, and Brian Stephens for NSSAR Alternate Trustee for California.

President Littlefield reported on the CASSAR Best Chapter Contest: only seven of the twenty-four chapters participated in 2019, and there was virtually no competition. The two reasons most often given for chapters who are not participating are: lack of resources (no one to report for the chapter), and no path to win the contest (no return on investment for the chapter). Efforts to get more participation have failed, and after careful review by the CASSAR Executive Committee, they do not see any viable options to save the Best Chapter Contest. President Littlefield suspended the contest as of January 1, 2021, by unanimous consent, and stated that if someone took on the project and came up with a viable solution, it could be readdressed at a future meeting.

John Dodd presented a proposal to amend the SAR Handbook to require that "awards for National Officers of Organizations by State Society or Chapter must be approved by the President General. Award requests will be submitted to the Executive Director at least 30 days prior to the ceremony so that the President General can approve and the proper certificate and engraving can be accomplished." This would specifically apply to the SAR Daughters of Liberty Medal, SAR Silver Good Citizenship Medal, SAR Bronze Good Citizenship Medal, SAR Medal of Appreciation, and Martha Washington Medal. Awards of a national scope should be approved by the National Society rather than by a state or chapter. Chaplain Carlson made a motion (seconded by President Rob Dickey of the Riverside Chapter) to have the California Society propose this amendment to the SAR Handbook to the NSSAR Medals & Awards Committee for consideration, which was approved.

President Littlefield declared a recess by unanimous consent at 11:56AM.

President Littlefield called the meeting back to order at 12:03PM. Genealogist Terry Briggs reported that he was looking for volunteers to enter CASSAR application lineages (since 1984) into the NSSAR Patriot Research System (PRS) database – California has 4,300 entered, and still has 3,600 to go. Chapters should encourage their members to volunteer – the data entry can be done at home on a computer, and the hours count towards earning the SAR Lafayette Volunteer Medal. VP South Jim Klingler reported on the NSSAR National Dues Task Force, which has four test markets – California (large state), Missouri (medium state), Delaware (small state), and Spain (international society). This is an effort to eliminate the need for the annual reconciliation, and states/chapters can run membership reports from the NSSAR system. The goal is to have California have the 2022 dues collected by the National Society.

Executive VP Stephens reported for the Budget Committee, consisting of Stephens (chairman), Invested Funds Trustee Renouf, VP South Klingler, and Treasurer Ferris. He presented the proposed 2021 CASSAR Budget (Exhibit B). Stephens reviewed the changes from the previous budget. VP South Klingler made a motion (seconded by President Phil Mitchell of the Orange County Chapter), to adopt the budget as presented, which was unanimously approved.

PUBLIC SERVICE AWARDS

President Littlefield presented the SAR Silver Roger Sherman Medal to VP North Craig Anderson, and to Chancellor John Dodd for their service to the state society. For the Spring Annual Meeting, he presented the SAR Bronze Roger Sherman Medal to Del Hanson, Michael Hull, and Russ Kaiser for their service on the public service awards, and to David Paulsen and George Brinley for their work on the swag bags. He presented the SAR Certificate of Appreciation to Phil Noble, Scott Brooks, Mark Mozdy, Russ Kaiser, David Cofer, Carl Ahlberg, Roy Adkins, and David Beach for their work on the meeting. President Littlefield presented the SAR Martha Washington Medal to Teresa Booth of Helms Briscoe for her negotiations with the Murieta Inn & Spa, and the Doubletree by Hilton Sonoma Wine Country. For the Fall Board of Managers Meeting, he presented the SAR Bronze Roger Sherman Medal to Bill Van Valkenburg and to Bill Nay for hotel planning, to Fred Schuster for his work on the Best Chapter Contest, and to Greg Hill for his many web services to the society. Finally, President Littlefield presented the SAR State Meritorious Service Medal to Jim Faulkinbury for his assistance proving lineages for pended applications, and to Terry Briggs for assisting with pended applications and managing the data entry for CASSAR applications into the SAR Patriot Research System (PRS).

President Littlefield declared a recess by unanimous consent at 12:53PM.

WESTERN DISTRICT MEETING

Vice President General Jim Fosdyck convened a meeting of the Western District at 12:54PM, with the assistance of Western District Secretary, Charles Smith. President Donald Littlefield of the California Society and President Michael Fitzpatrick of the Nevada Society were in attendance. Terry Briggs noted that the Nevada and Hawaii societies have all their application lineages entered into the NSSAR Patriot Research System. VPG Fosdyck noted the passing of Brian Worcester, a past Vice President General from the Nevada Society, and an active member at the National level, on September 1, 2020. VPG Fosdyck also noted that Charles Smith was nominated for Vice President General of the Western District at the upcoming SAR Annual Congress in Renton, Washington, in July 2021. The Western District endorsed the same National officer candidates as were endorsed by the California Society by unanimous consent. President Fitzpatrick of the Nevada Society stated that the Nevada Society was trying to enhance their annual meetings with quality speakers, as well as participate in education and community involvement. Tentatively, they are scheduling a Spring Meeting in Reno, Nevada, if they are able to hold the meeting in-person. VPG Fosdyck noted that the Western District has a

new, revamped website by Greg Hill at www.WDSAR.org. Vice President General Fosdyck adjourned the meeting of the Western District by unanimous consent at 1:00PM.

President Littlefield called the CASSAR Board of Managers Meeting back to order at 1:00PM, and noted that we had about 75 participants in the Zoom Meeting. The Benediction was given by Chaplain Lou Carlson. The recessional was led by Jim Klingler. President Littlefield adjourned the meeting by unanimous consent at 1:03PM (Pacific Time).

145th ANNUAL MEETING OF THE MEMBERSHIP CALIFORNIA SOCIETY SONS OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION Zoom Meeting April 18, 2020

The meeting was opened by President Taylor at 9am. The invocation was given by Chaplain Louis V. Carlson, Jr. The Pledge of Allegiance was led by Don Littlefield. The SAR Pledge was led by Craig Anderson.

Secretary Fred Schuster did the Roll Call (**Exhibit A**). A quorum was established. Terry Briggs chose to act as a delegate from his chapter rather than as Genealogist, voting as chapter president. He will vote as Chapter President.

Noted guests included; VPG Fosdyck, Genealogist General Jim Faulkinbury, National Trustee for CA Derek Brown, National Trustee for NV Charles Smith, Former President General Joseph W. Dooley and Executive Committee member John Dodd.

In order to explicitly authorize this Annual Meeting via electronic means, there were two bylaw proposal votes. Proposal #2 (Exhibit B) adds a new subsection (i) to Bylaw 8, Section 1, which authorizes state meetings to be conducted via the internet, and establishes the rules governing electronic meetings. This motion was passed unanimously. Proposal #3 (Exhibit C) adds a new subsection (j) to Bylaw 8, Section 1, which authorizes the Executive Committee to change the time and place of a state meeting in an emergency. This motion was passed unanimously.

The remaining of the By-Law will be discussed later.

Minutes of the April 2019 meeting were taken up. It was moved by Douglas Bergtholdt to approve. This was seconded by Don Littlefield. There was no discussion, the motion passed. The minutes for the Fall Board of Managers Meeting of November 2019 were asked for approval. Derek Brown moved to approve. This was seconded by Don Littlefield. The motion passed. "President Taylor addressed the membership by noting how we have entered a new era with technology based meetings. He noted the illness of Oliver Everett and asked for prayers for him and his wife. His illness is not virus related, having experienced several strokes. President Taylor thanked all for their support during his term as state president. He noted this pandemic has been a challenge to the society. There were three initiatives he tried to complete during his term. 1) a new membership booklet. 2) He wanted to define the chapter areas. And 3) have a FAQs section added to the state website. Again he thanked all for their support during his term as President.

OFFICER REPORTS

President Robert Taylor—In the book, noting he presented an additional Sea Cadet Award. **Executive Vice-President** Donald Littlefield—In the Book.

Past President/National Trustee Derek Brown—Report is in the book. He noted that Sarah Dennison is leaving the society. The Bermuda Trip has been cancelled. They are continuing with plans for the Richmond Congress as well as contingency plans if it has to be cancelled.

Eagle Scout—Chairman Bill Nay's report is in the book. He reported we have 2 Robert E. Burt Awards and that Jim Blauer received the NOESA (NESA Outstanding Eagle Scout Award) for all the certificates he has done for the local Eagle Scouts in Orange County. These were from both SAR and Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War. Bill plans at attend the Order of the Arrow Conference in August and help man the SAR booth.

Knight Essay Contest—Patrick Cecil had no report

ROTC/JROTC—Rob Dickey reported the recipient of the JROTC Enhancement Essay is Cadet SMSGT Megan Lange of Casa Roble Fundamental High School. Located in Orangevale, California. Sacramento SAR Chapter. She will become the recipient of our Enhancement Medal, Bar and Certificate with a \$1,000.00 scholarship check.

Spirit of America—Bob Taylor reported it is in the book.

Valley Forge—Bob Taylor reported it is in the book

Brochure Contest—Compatriot Kevin Tierney reported 53 Brochures were submitted.

Oration Contest—John Ferris' report is in the book. No entries.

Sea Cadets—Bill Nay's report is in the book. He has a proposal for later.

OLD BUSINESS

Audit Committee—Jim Klingler was asked to comment on this. He noted that he was the one being audited and he was not on the committee. There was no report submitted by the committee.

DAR Referrals—The DAR Award was discussed. SAR Medals are given to DAR members for providing SAR applicants who are subsequently approved. There was a motion (**Exhibit G**) by Brian Stephens for CASSAR to additionally give a \$100 cash award to the DAR chapter that provides the highest number of approved SAR applications (if greater than 5), and added to the DAR liaison budget, effective 2020 calendar year. The motion was passed unanimously.

Dues Collection--Genealogist General Jim Faulkinbury gave an update on the CASSAR dues collection proposal. He said since NSSAR has its own plan, he is dropping the state proposal. CASSAR is a test group for the NSSAR program.

CAR Request--President Taylor said the CAR Liaison needed to request a check to be sent to the CAR for the year.

Black Powder Insurance--Color Guard Commander Mark Kramer reported on liability and black powder insurance. He said NSSAR now has a national safety procedure (covering insurance and training requirements), and he commended John Dodd for working behind the scenes to get it established. Commander Kramer said he would get the national policy posted to the state website.

NEW BUSINESS

By-Laws—Proposal #1— Chancellor John Dodd presented Bylaws Proposal #1 (Exhibit H) to delete Bylaw 2, Section 6, which discusses the Ladies Auxiliary. He explained the Ladies Auxiliary is a separate legal entity that is not controlled by CASSAR, and it does not belong in the Bylaw regarding CASSAR chapters. There is potential legal liability for CASSAR if the Ladies Auxiliary decides to cancel their liability insurance. Some members thought we should recognize the Ladies Auxiliary in the CASSAR Bylaws, so a compromise amendment was offered to remove Section 6 from Bylaw 2, and create a new Bylaw 10 for the Ladies Auxiliary. The amendment to the original proposal was passed. The proposal as amended was then passed. Chancellor Dodd noted that the Ladies Auxiliary were short of funds for the liability insurance due to declining membership. He encouraged all CASSAR Compatriots to have their wives, daughters and other female relatives join the Ladies Auxiliary to support their vital work supporting CASSAR.

Sea Cadet Award—Bill Nay reported the committee met and approved the awarding a Sea Cadet of the Year Award to begin in 2021. It is a \$1,000 Award. This was seconded by Rob Dickey. Bill Nay requested a \$1700 increase in budget to handle award and any travel expenses needed to get the winner to our meeting to receive the award. John Dodd noted we need to make sure this award is consistent with the other Youth Awards we give out. Bill noted the \$1000 is consistent with the other awards. Treasurer Jim Klingler noted we give \$1970 to JROTC and Eagle winners, \$1770 to Essay and Oration winners and \$1200 to Poster and Brochure winners. It was also reported that we have \$1400 in a travel account set up in the budget for those that need financial assistance getting to and from the meeting to receive their award. The motion for \$1,000 was voted on and passed.

California Compatriot cost for printed copy. At the Fall Board of Managers meeting it was raised to \$45 as it would cost \$15.00 per copy to print and mail out. Afterwards it was determined that the cost would only be \$25.00 for the three issues. The Executive Board agreed to the reduction and it has to be voted on by the membership. It was moved (Did not recognize the voice and no name was given) and seconded. The motion to reduce the cost of printing and mailing three copies per year to \$25 passed. Jim Klingler has a list of those on printing list.

NEW BUSINESS

DAR meal was discussed. The question arising is whether the \$250 is just to cover the State Regent's meal or whether it covers other items as well.

We recessed at 11:17am

Reconciliation Reports was discussed. Fred noted the information was placed in the California Compatriot. The biggest problem he noted exists with Dual Members. Some he does not have records of. The Junior Membership is understated as the state and national figures are very different. Don Littlefield noted this very big topic and we need to move on.

Memorial Service—Lou Carlson was asked if he was ready to do a Memorial Service. He replied he was not. He suggested we do it in the Fall. It was noted that CASSAR President Stan Henderson had passed away. An obituary is to be run in the Compatriot. His wife Linda passed away just a short time before he did. Information on both is to be sent to the California Compatriot. It was noted member Dale Ritter was 100 years old when he passed away around the same time as President Henderson. Chaplain Carlson noted he had 15 members on the list for the service that we will defer until the Fall Board of Managers Meeting.

Honorable Mention went to San Diego (Poster E) with a \$75 award. There are no ribbons this year as all the shops are closed down from the pandemic. Posters will be posted on the state website so members can view them.

Brochure Contest—Kevin Tierney reported they had 53 Brochures sent in by four chapters. Medallions and checks will be sent to the chapter Chairmen for presentation to the winners. First Place Orange County (Brochure D) receives \$400. Second Place Sacramento (Poster C) receives \$300. They sent in 33 brochures. Third Place Mother Lode (Brochure B) receives \$200. Fourth Place Gold Country (Brochure A) receives \$100.

Knight Essay Contest—Patrick Cecil was not available. Compatriot Perkins from the Sons of Liberty Chapter reported that their entry was the state winner. Anaida Haroutonian wrote her essay on "Building Blocks—Lights, Camera, Action". There is a \$1000 award. They need the check to present to the winner. President Taylor will check with Patrick on the medallion presented from the state.

Oration Contest—John Ferris reported there were no entries this year.

Eagle Scout Scholarship Contest—Bill Nay reported that Michael McPhie from the Orange County Chapter entry was the state winner. He showed photos of Michael and of his receiving the chapter Award at the Orange County meeting. He noted the presenter in the chapter photo was Compatriot Hans Hunt who is one of this year's Robert E. Burt Award recipients. Bill reported he has the check for \$1000 and is waiting to get the sculpture engraved. He is also waiting to hear on the Richmond Congress. Robert E. Burt Scouting Volunteer Award—Bill nay reported that Hans Hunt from Orange County and William Stewart Crew from Central Coast are two to receive this award this year. He noted the state is allowed to give out 4 per year so if there are any other SAR scouters out there, get their applications in and see if we can fill our quota for the year.

Public Service Awards—Don Littlefield reported there were four this year (Exhibit I). There were three heroism Awards and one Law Enforcement award. Dell Hanson announced that Deputy Brian Bell of the Sacramento County's Sheriff's Department, Officer Scott Farnsworth and Officer Chris Cobb of the West Sacramento Police Department received the Heroism Award. The Nevada Society 65th Annual State Conference April 4, 2020

The 65th Annual State Conference was scheduled to take place at the Atlantis Casino Resort in Reno Nevada on the 4th and 5th of April 2020. Opening Remarks President Donald L Hotchkiss Jr.

6. President Hotchkiss asked for Chapter Reports:

- a.
